The State Historic Preservation Office has reviewed the information in response to your request for comments concerning the above matter. It is this office's understanding that the project proponent seeks to construct, maintain, and operate a 4.0-megawatt AC battery energy storage facility, to be located at Parcel No. 95-F10-247-5 and 95-F10-247-5A, 163 State Pier Road, New London.

It is our opinion that the subject property does not appear to be eligible for listing on either the State or National Register of Historic Places. Based on the information provided to this office, <u>no historic properties will be affected</u>.
