RUPNER, Ilmar

Ilmar Rupner, age 86, of Vernon, beloved husband of Barbara Rupner, died Monday, (November 24, 2003) at a local convalescent home. He was born in St. Petersburg, Russia, in 1917. He emigrated to the United States in 1949 with his (first) wife, Irina, and his two daughters. They settled in Manchester where he worked first in a local factory, and then as a carpenter. During this time, he and his good friend, Ludis Upenicks, formed their new company, U & R Housing, which has thrived for the last 45 years. **Together, Ilmar and Ludis built custom homes with a broad appeal. Their unique designs were innovative and their quality craftsmanship became their signature trademark.** Ilmar moved to Vernon in 1965 where he was able to spend more time pursuing his hobbies. He enjoyed breeding and racing harness horses, as well as raising Oriental Frill pigeons for which he received the title of Master Breeder. Upon retirement in the 1980s, Ilmar and Barbara started to travel extensively. They fell in love with Switzerland, especially the beautiful mountains and lakes surrounding their second home in Brienz. In addition to Barbara, Ilmar is survived by daughters Brigita Burr of New York City, Anita Newberry and her husband Warren of Vernon, and step-daughter Mariola Wojtczak of Manchester; six grandchildren, including Cameron Burr and his wife Carol, Whitney Burr and his wife Pamela, Kelsey Roberts and her husband Doug, Andrew Burr, Skip Newberry and Kristin Newberry; and four great-grandchildren. A memorial service will be held Saturday, November 29, at 10 a.m., at the Latvian Lutheran Church, 21 Garden Street, Manchester.
