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CITIZENS GUIDE TO SITING COUNCIL PROCEDURES FOR FEASIBILITY PROCEEDINGS

1. The Connecticut Siting Council

The Connecticut Siting Council (Council) consists of nine members from all over the state. Five members are appointed by the Governor and four members are designees of the Senate, the House, the Commissioner of Energy and Environmental Protection and the Chairman of the Public Utilities Regulatory Authority. At least two members are experienced in ecology and not more than one member has an affiliation, past or present, with any utility or government utility regulatory agency. The Council reviews applications on the need for and placement of cell towers, power plants, power lines and other energy and telecommunications infrastructure, and any significant environmental impacts.

2. Nature of Siting Council Proceedings

The Council's proceedings are very different from a local planning and zoning hearing or a town meeting. The Council jurisdiction is limited to hearing applications presented to us; the Council has no planning function. Council proceedings are governed by state statute: specifically, the Uniform Administrative Procedures Act. This means that the hearing is conducted in a manner similar to a courtroom proceeding. Public hearings must be held in an orderly fashion to ensure the transcriptionist is able to record every word. The Council maintains web pages that contain record materials for each proceeding that is pending before the Council.

3. Participants in Siting Council Feasibility Proceedings

The participants in a Council Feasibility Proceeding consist of the following:

- a. **Requesting Entity:** The requesting entity is the person or company seeking to share, or install equipment on, an existing tower facility and is a party in the proceeding. The requesting entity files evidence with the Council before the hearing and presents witnesses at the hearing for questioning by the Council and other participants in the proceeding. Questions from the Council and other participants in the hearing are limited to the subject matter that is filed before the hearing. The requesting entity may ask questions of other parties and intervenors on evidence that was submitted by those parties and intervenors before the hearing.
- b. **Parties and Intervenors:** Parties and intervenors are participants in the proceeding who requested party or intervenor status from the Council before the hearing and were granted such status. Both parties and intervenors file evidence with the Council before the hearing and present witnesses at the hearing for questioning by the Council and other parties and intervenors in the proceeding. Parties and intervenors may ask questions of the requesting entity and other parties and intervenors on evidence that was submitted by the requesting entity and other parties and intervenors before the hearing. Parties and intervenors are not allowed to make their own case by giving oral testimony at the hearing. They must make their case in writing and, in exchange, they may cross-examine the requesting entity and other parties and intervenors and their witnesses.
- c. **Limited Appearance Statements:** Limited appearance statements are made by residents and other persons who would like to express their comments and concerns about the proposed shared use of the existing tower facility by providing an oral statement during the public comment session of the hearing or by submitting a written statement to the Council before, during or after the hearing. They may not ask questions of the requesting entity, parties and intervenors, or the Council. The 6:30 PM public comment session of the hearing is reserved for oral limited appearance statements.

No person who is a party or intervenor in the proceeding may also make an oral limited appearance statement during the public comment session of the hearing or submit a written limited appearance statement to the Council before, during or after the hearing.

The Council requests that oral limited appearance statements are brief in order to ensure all concerned persons have an opportunity express their concerns at the hearing. Oral limited appearance statements must be spoken into the microphone to be acknowledged by the Council and to be part of the transcript of the hearing.

4. Council Review of Requests to Share Existing Towers

There is a tower sharing policy in the state to prevent the unnecessary proliferation of towers. Requesting entities present the Council with a request to share an existing tower facility. The Council does not establish search areas or select sites for cell towers that are not proposed by the requesting entity.

Cell phone service providers have a right to compete. Even if one or more other cell phone service providers have coverage and service in the area, the Council may not preclude another cell phone service provider from sharing an existing facility to provide coverage for the area provided that the carrier can provide evidence of its own need for the service.

The cell phone service provider has the burden of proving to the Council that the site selected is needed to provide cell phone service and that shared use of the facility would be technically, legally, economically and environmentally feasible, and meets public safety concerns.

The role of the Council is to review the service provider's evidence of need for cell phone service in the selected area and evidence of the technical, legal, economic and environmental feasibility of sharing an existing tower. This includes consideration of public safety concerns. The Council does not determine any compensation for shared use of a tower. **The Council may not consider health and environmental effects of radio frequency emissions in the decision-making process – the Federal Communications Commission has exclusive authority to regulate radio frequency emissions and set acceptable levels.**

After balancing the need for cell phone service against the technical, legal, economic and environmental feasibility of sharing an existing tower, and considering public safety concerns, the Council makes a decision to approve or deny the request for shared use of a tower, or to approve the request for shared use of a tower with modifications. The decision is made at a Council meeting held at least 30 days after any public hearings. Council meetings are typically held at the Council's office, and all agendas are publicly noticed.
