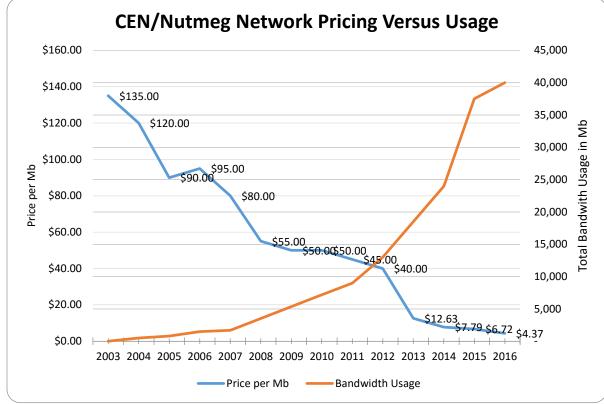

# Value and Efficiency

For over 13 years, the CEN has met increased demands (e.g., 1:1 computing and online testing) while keeping operational costs level, resulting in a dramatic drop in bandwidth costs:



In addition to saving its members on the cost of digital circuits, the CEN provides the following benefits:

- Cost-recovery model operations that contain member charges unlike for-profit competitors
- Free content filtering for all K 12 students (federal requirement), valued at \$2M+ annually
- Proprietary peering agreements that keep paid circuit costs to ~10% of bandwidth usage



Impact and Benefits

- Back-office management of circuit agreements, vendor billing, and reimbursements
- Operation in a cost-recovery model, which passes savings on to members
- Delivery of free and low-cost software that supports research (e.g., iCONN) and town
  operations as well as digital content (CPTV, CT•N, etc.)

# Capacity

The CEN remains uniquely poised to meet the exponential growth in bandwidth needs, with many schools supporting 2+ devices per student and 25% of districts expecting up to a 500% increase in bandwidth demands over the next 18 months:

- Scalability based on state-of-the-art technology, with speeds up to 400 Gbps
- Extensive partnership agreements (current and planned) through CEN's content-delivery network with tier-1 providers including Akamai, Apple, Google, Microsoft, and Netflix
- Ring architecture that provides multiple points of failover from natural disasters and Internet service provider (ISP) outages, ensuring access to statewide systems and content
- Provision of backup ISP and filtering services

### K – 12 Schools

- Proven ability to meet the demands of digital learning, such as state-mandated online testing, student and teacher devices, digital textbooks, and learning-management systems
- Connections to every district that lead to digital equity and support student achievement
- Access free educational resources, reducing the cost of education

### Universities and Research Centers

- Inability of commercial carriers to offer CT State and Community Colleges the same capacity or service they currently receive from the CEN
- Direct connection to Internet2, a key in attracting and retaining research centers such as Jackson Laboratories and UConn Health Center

### Towns and Libraries

- Enables libraries to support lifelong learning, technology literacy, access to e-government, small business development, job seekers, and citizens' global information needs
- Ability to provide affordable, secure, high-capacity, high-performance networking
- Access to shared services including digital phone, streaming, and back-office systems

## Service

With headquarters in Hartford and staff working statewide, the CEN remains highly responsive and resourceful in supporting its educational, library, municipal, and research customers:

- 24 X 7 support, a critical service for many customers (e.g., colleges) that remain operational at all times and depend on secure broadband connectivity
- Access to senior technical staff who implement timely, custom solutions, versus impersonal ticket queues and escalation rules of commercial providers
- Ability to solve complex challenges such as failures in content filtering and cyber attacks
- Team of research and education specialists acutely focused on the needs of our customers
