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Back to budget battle

Growing fixed costs to complicate Malloy-legislature talks

HARTFORD — A spike in fixed costs, shrinking revenue and feeble economic growth are setting up another taxing round of budget deliberations for Gov. Dannel P. Malloy and the legislature.

By the latest estimates, Malloy and legislators are going to have to close a gap of more than \$1 billion in the upcoming 2018 fiscal year to balance the next two-year budget plan.

The signals coming from Hartford suggest most of the balancing will be accomplished through reducing spending. This was how a \$960 million gap in the 2017 budget was closed.

The big problem: projected growth in fixed costs for pension contributions, retiree health benefits, debt service, entitlements and federal mandates. In the state's lagging recovery from the Great Recession, predicted economic gains are insufficient to check the

SOLD FOR SEX

Human trafficking is a crime of mind games, addiction and intimidation, and police say it is happening here

The girls were 16, one just barely. Rootless and searching. Both were short and thin, one a bit more timid. She met her new friend when they had both run away from foster homes.

Neither were street-smart. For a couple of months, they holed up in a series of Waterbury houses before they heard of a place they could stay in Watertown. One weekend in February, they set out for it.

These two teens — vulnerable, longing for attention, stability and money — became victims of what police are calling the latest criminal epidemic to sweep Connecticut and the nation: the manipulation and sale of juveniles for sex.

Last week, two Connecticut men were convicted in separate cases. The U.S. Attorney's office said Romane St. Christopher McKenzie, 24, of Hartford, was advertising sex for sale with a 15-year-old girl on backpage.com. He sold her for sex at motels in Enfield and South Windsor. The girl bought crack cocaine from McKenzie, who goes by his street names of Wookie, Rude, and Rude Boy, police said.

McKenzie was sentenced to 10 years in federal prison.

Also last week, Ramon Gomez, 40, of Uncasville, pleaded guilty to sex trafficking and drug charges. He pimped out a 17-year-old girl in a Groton motel room, and sold heroin which was given
