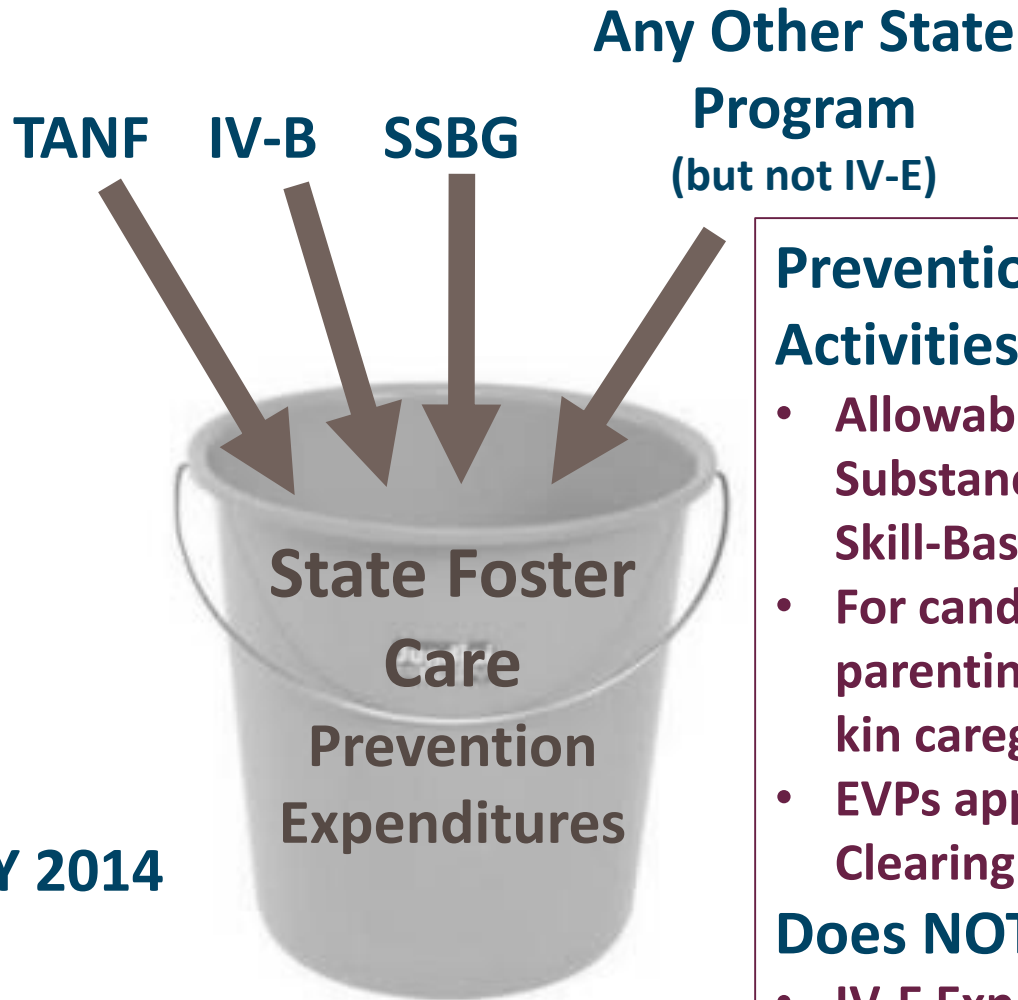


Family First Prevention Service Act Maintenance of Effort

- States must use title IV-E prevention services to supplement, and not supplant “**state foster care prevention expenditures**”.
- The state title IV-E agency is required to maintain at least the same level of “state foster care prevention expenditures” each FFY as the amount the agency spent in FFY 2014.
- State foster care prevention expenditures can not be used for the state share of FFPSA prevention claims.

Prevention Services and Activities

- Allowable types (Mental Health, Substance Abuse or In-Home Parent Skill-Based Programs)
- For candidates, pregnant or parenting youth or their parents and kin caregivers
- EVPs approved by IV-E Prevention Clearinghouse and trauma-informed


Does NOT Include:

- IV-E Expenditures
