


CT DCJ Fact Sheet:

New Haven Judicial District


The New Haven Judicial District (JD) contains 13 municipalities, 3 DOC facilities and several colleges and universities. The District is has two GA courts: GA 23 in New Haven and GA 7 in Meriden.

About 470,000 people live in the District, making it the second largest JD in the state. District-wide, per capita income in 2018 was estimated at \$38,497 per person. Statewide, per capita income was \$43,056. Within the District per capita income ranged from \$28,818 in New Haven to \$60,843 in Guilford.

Although 35% of residents in the JD self-identified as members of ethnic or racial minority groups in 2014, 91% of Black non-Hispanics and 82% of Hispanics in the District lived in either Hamden, Meriden or New Haven.



The incidence of crime in the New Haven JD varies significantly across the 13-town region. The city of New Haven, while, home to only 25% of the District's residents. accounted for 67% of the District's violent crime and 47% of its property crime in 2017. Among GA-23 towns, New Haven accounted for 94% of the violent crime and 74% of property crimes. On a positive note, the city is less violent than it was in the recent past. In 2010, the FBI ranked New Haven as the 4th most dangerous city in the nation.

Each year, the FBI releases
Uniform Crime Report data (UCR)
which tallies the major crimes that
are reported in local jurisdictions
in the previous calendar year. In
this data, murders, robberies,
aggravated assaults and rape are
grouped as violent crime.
Property crimes are larceny,
burglary and motor vehicle theft
and arson.

The volume of criminal caseloads at GA-23 in New Haven is typically twice as large as the volume at GA-7 in Meriden. The presence of the I-95 and I-91 corridors helps to explain the high volume of motor vehicle infractions in the JD. MV infractions are non-criminal offenses and do not result in arrest.

In terms of criminal arrests, the New Haven Police is the most active law enforcement agency in the

District. Half of all arrests in the 13-town region, in 2019, were booked in New Haven.

Given the high incidence of crime, it is not surprising that New Haven is also the most heavily-policed town in the district. In 2017, New Haven had

over 3 sworn officer for every 1,000 residents. Most other towns in the district had less than 2 sworn officers per 1,000 residents.

Most people arrested in CT are released with a promise-to-appear (PTA) agreement, or after paying a bond. In general, about 20% of people are unable to meet these release conditions. As a result they held in lock-ups until they can be arraigned before a judge. At arraignment, judges may impose new release conditions.

Over 12,000 criminal cases are disposed each year in the New Haven District's two GA courts.

The most serious cases in the GA are often transferred to the Part A Court at the JD. In a typical year, the New Haven GA transfers the most cases.

Because they involve more serious charges,

Part A transfer cases are more likely to go to trial. In fact, only a small percentage of cases in the JD were disposed at trial. Statewide, the figure was 4%.

In terms of total reported crime, the New Haven Judicial District is second only to Hartford In number of property and violent crimes reported by residents.
