# **MEMORANDUM OF DECISION**

This matter involves a grocery beer liquor permit issued to Junior's Supermarket, 651 Albany Avenue, Hartford, Connecticut. A formal administrative hearing was held before the Department of Consumer Protection on March 25, 2010. Maria Perez, permittee and backer, appeared with her daughter.

The following charges are alleged against the Respondent. It is alleged that on or about January 23, 2009, the Respondent violated (1) Sec. 30-6-A24(a) of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies by selling untaxed Newport cigarettes, loose cigarettes and bootleg CDs; (2) Sec. 30-20(b) of the Connecticut General Statutes and (3) Sec. 30-6-A40(i) of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies in that the beer prices were not properly displayed; (4) Sec. 30-53 of the Connecticut General Statutes in that the liquor permit had not been filed with the Hartford Town Clerk; and (5) Sec. 30-6-A12 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies in that permittee's name sign was not posted. The Respondent denied charges 1, 2, 3 and 4, admitted charge 5, and the matter proceeded to a hearing.

Based upon the testimony and documents presented at the hearing, we find the following facts. On January 23, 2009, at approximately 1:00 p.m., Liquor Control agents conducted a general inspection at Junior's Supermarket. Ramon ("Junior") Perez, the

owner's son, was present at the time of the inspection and assisted the agents. Packs of

Newport cigarettes which bore a Virginia tax stamp, rather than a Connecticut tax stamp,

were being sold by this premises. Individual cigarettes and bootleg CDs were also being

sold at these premises. The liquor permit had not been recorded with the Hartford Town

Clerk, as required, and the prices of the beer being sold were not displayed on a sign

adjacent to the beer coolers, on the shelving or on the beer products themselves. The

permittee's name was not posted on a sign adjacent to the main entrance as required.

At the time of this incident, Ms. Perez was not involved in the day-to-day

operations of Junior's Supermarket. However, the permittee is held strictly accountable

for the conduct of his or her permit premises and we strongly caution Ms. Perez that she

needs to be mindful of the requirements of the Liquor Control Act in the future.

Based upon the substantial evidence, and the Respondent's admission, we find the

Respondent to be in violation of Charges 1-5, as alleged. The Liquor Control Act vests in

the Commission a liberal discretionary power to determine factual matters with regard to

liquor permits and to suspend or revoke the permit, after a hearing, if it deems

appropriate. Dadiskos v. Liquor Control Commission, 150 Conn. 425, 190 A.2d 490

(1963). Accordingly, we hereby suspend Junior's Supermarket's grocery store beer

liquor permit for a period of two (2) days.
