DENTAL HYGIENE STUDENTS FROM FONES VISIT VARCA

One of the main goals of DDS dental coordinator is to educate future dental providers on delivering dental care to people with intellectual disabilities. This opportunity arose when five dental hygiene students from Fones Dental Hygiene School and their instructor, Joanna Trigilidas, visited VARCA on a rainy day. VARCA, which stands for The Valley Association for Retarded Children and Adults, is a "private non-profit organization which provides handicapped individuals the opportunity to

experience meaningful employment".

About 30 interested individuals who work in VARCA received an oral exam, oral hygiene instructions, a toothbrush and toothpaste. Individuals who did not have a dentist of record were strongly encouraged to see a dentist and were provided with a referral. VARCA's nurse, Denise Bucci, and staff were very supportive of this project and helped the hygiene students coordinate this event.

All of the dental hygiene students were very impressed with the facility and enjoyed meeting the consumers and getting a grand tour of the facility. It was a wonderful experience for all.

Special Smiles Program- Grotto Humanitarian Foundations – A Best Kept Secret

I recently had a pleasure of meeting Mr. David Cole, who is a volunteer dental coordinator for an organization called the Grotto Humanitarian Foundation. This organization believes that children with special needs should live life as fully and independently as possible. They are passionately committed to helping alleviate the suffering and improving children's quality of life by providing dental care for those children who otherwise might go without. Their motto is, "One Smile at a Time". The program is geared towards children who have been diagnosed with MR, Cerebral Palsy, Muscular Dystrophy or Organ Transplant who are under the age of 18. This program is appropriately called "The Special Smiles Program".

The Special Smiles Program (a 501(c)(3) nonprofit) is intended as a second carrier to private insurance, and acts as the primary carrier if insurance is not available. This service is intended to help families with the expenses that are not covered by the insurance company, but are needed to maintain good oral health including hospital and anesthesia costs when needed. One of such services may be restorations, crowns or general anesthesia. Once the child is qualified for supplemental coverage from Grotto, it is for the duration of their childhood! What a gift!

The Connecticut coordinator, David Cole, is very committed to this program. He will personally drive to the family's home, interview the family and help them submit the documentation to be approved by Grotto.
