- Most Important Component of a Brownfield Project other than getting the \$
 - o The procurement process, selection of a consultant, contracting and oversight
- To secure the highest possible measure of professional service for a fair and reasonable fee
- To allow for a means to establish control over the project and meet the stated objectives
- OBRD will focus on two areas during project review:
 - Development of Scope of Services for RFP
 - Contract between grantee & consultant before execution



- ■RFQ then RFP or combined RFQ/RFP
- Development of Scope of Services
 - o RFQ = "in general"
 - RFP = specific & describe as clearly as possible goals for the
 project and work to be done requires comprehensive understanding
 of the project
- Under \$50,000 vs. Over \$50,000
- Selection Committee



- Final Selection based on:
 - Review of Fee Proposals
 - Committee's predetermined selection criteria
- Contract Execution
 - ODon't be afraid to negotiate fee proposal before signing off
- Contract Administration & Project Management
