State Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit Program

State Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credits were recently awarded for the completion of four properties - one in New Britain and three in Hartford. The Porter Block building on Main Street in New Britain was developed into mixeduse. 246 and 250 Lawrence Street in Hartford placed two, 6-unit buildings back in service earlier this year. Finally, the Batterson Building, located at 28 High Street in Hartford created affordable housing units in the historic downtown commercial building. Nobel Laureate for Literature Toni Morrison lamented the absence of memorial markers at locations of significance in the history of African Americans. She noted in most places there is no statue not even a bench by the road to sit and reflect. The Toni Morrison Society seeks to remedy this absence through their Bench by the Road Project. Museum staff is pleased that the Town of Canterbury, Sustainable CT, and State Attorney Anne Mahoney are collaborating to fund the cost of shipping and a dedication ceremony through a crowdsourcing fundraiser. Henry Whitfield State Museum

We're reopening in June! Museum staff is eager to welcome visitors back inside the Whitfield House and Visitor Center for a safe and engaging experience. The museum will be open Thursday-Sunday, 10:00-4:00, through October. Visitors can take self-guided tours of the 1639 Whitfield

House with three floors of exhibits, furnishings, and artifacts. The Visitor Center features a gift shop, research library (by appointment), and exhibit galleries.
