NEHFES & Archaeological Conservancy

The Archaeological Conservancy and the New **England Hebrew Farmers of** the Emanuel Society (NEHFES) cosigned a **Donation Agreement that** gifted the synagogue parcel of the "NEHFES Synagogue and Creamery Site" in Chesterfield, Connecticut to The Conservancy. The synagogue parcel is one of the few American Jewish archaeological sites in the country and the donation insures the protection of the site in perpetuity.

Preservation of the NEHFES Synagogue and Creamery Site will contribute to public knowledge about the site's significance and the importance of cultural resource preservation. The preserve will be maintained as an open-space research preserve, and protected against any future development. The Archaeological Conservancy, established in 1980, is the only national non-profit organization dedicated to acquiring and preserving the

Federal Infrastructure Bill and the SHPO

Historically, federal expenditures on infrastructure were greatest during the period 1955 to 1965. A response to this intense national undertaking was the subsequent passing of several environmental regulatory laws, including the National Historic Preservation Act - which created State Historic Preservation Offices. The recently passed bipartisan infrastructure bill will rival the mid twentieth century investments. The bill will bring over \$5 billion to Connecticut for work that includes spending on roads, bridges and railroads, as well as, expanding internet access and electric vehicle car charging stations.

These projects will be executed with regulatory oversight. CT SHPO will be commenting on every proposed project in our state with the goal of avoiding or minimizing impacts to our state's important historic resources. While our office will be busy, we are privileged to have the opportunity within this historic national effort to help make projects better.

Frederick Law Olmsted 200th Anniversary



On November 30, Department of Transportation Commissioner Joseph Giulietti joined Bridgeport Mayor Joseph Ganim, along with the State Historic Preservation Office and Connecticut Chapter of American Society of Landscape Architects to unveil the new Frederic Law Olmsted 200th Anniversary monument by artist Louise Wiley.

The Frederic Law Olmsted 200th Anniversary Monument Dedication Ceremony is part of the Olmsted

200 celebrations across the state. The monument, specially commissioned by the CTDOT as part of a road improvement project, is a bronze sculpted bust of the famous Connecticut-born landscape architect Frederic Law Olmsted.

Prudence Crandall Museum



Prudence Crandall Museum received a bench as part of the Toni Morrison Society's "Bench by the Road" program. The bench was dedicated on Sunday, September 19, 2021. The initiative for the bench was led by Windham State Attorney Anne Mahoney, who worked with First Selectman Chris Lippke of the Town of Canterbury and Sustainable CT to raise funds. Speakers for the event included Eboni S. Nelson, Dean of the University of Connecticut School of Law, Donald E. Williams, Jr., Executive Director of the Connecticut Education Association. Frederick-Douglass Knowles II, English Professor at Three Rivers College and Poet Laureate of Hartford, and Daniel Donaghy, English Professor at Eastern Connecticut State University, shared poems in honor of the bench dedication. The "Bench by the Road" bench will be one of the centerpieces of a peaceful reflection area on the grounds of the Prudence Crandall Museum.

The Prudence Crandall Museum is scheduled to be open during the 2022 season! Restoration work is nearing completion, and staff looks forward to

welcoming visitors in the months ahead. An official reopening date is coming soon!
