## **New to the National Register of Historic Places**

Congratulations to the residents and property owners within the **Bedford-Garden Streets Historic District in Hartford**, which was listed on the National Register of Historic Places last month. The district is comprised of 32 historic buildings located roughly along Bedford, Garden, Brooks, and Mather streets. The district features mostly multi-famliy



properties, with a few religious and mixed-use buildings, as well. The district is significant for its role in the development of the Clay-Arsenal and Upper Albany neighborhood in the early twentieth century.

Ten of the historic district properties located along Bedford and Brooks streets are currently undergoing rehabilitation using the state and federal historic rehabilitation tax credits
