## **Advocacy Week**



Week returned to Washington D.C. in person this year from March 6<sup>th</sup>-March 8<sup>th</sup>! State Historic Preservation Officer Jonathan Kinney and Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer Cathy Labadia traveled to the event, which was co-hosted by the National Conference of State Historic Preservation Officers (NCSHPO) and Preservation Action.

On Monday, Jonathan and Cathy attended the NCSHPO annual meeting,

where representatives from 44 SHPO's (including those from Guam and Puerto Rico) met to share information, discuss the current federal historic preservation landscape, and to hear updates from many of our federal partners, including the National Park Service, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, the National Trust for Historic Preservation, and the National Alliance of Preservation Commission. Tuesday's programming included a number of wonderful speakers at the historic Saint Mark's church on Capitol Hill, including the two co-chairs of the House Historic Preservation Caucus, Representatives Earl Blumenauer of Oregon and Representative Michael Turner of Ohio, followed by a variety of tour offerings. On Wednesday, Jonathan and Cathy, joined by Executive Director Jane Montanaro of Preservation Connecticut and Ernest Andreoli III, a UCONN law student and intern at the ACHP, visited the offices of all seven members of Connecticut's congressional delegation and spoke with their staff on a number of preservation related topic. The two primary legislative topics discussed were the importance of a permanent reauthorization of the federal Historic Preservation Fund, which is expiring this Fall, and the importance of passing the Historic Tax Credit Growth and Opportunity Act (HTC-GO). The event was capped off by a reception with short presentations by four members of Congress and an amazing behind-the-scenes tour of the U.S. Capitol Building!

### **New Grant Initiative for Archaeology**

SHPO is pleased to announce the launch of a new non-matching Survey and Planning Grant for geophysical surveys. The purpose of this survey is to use remote sensing techniques to identify unmarked or unidentified burials that are more than 100 years old. The specific techniques used may include Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR), Electromagnetic Conductivity, and/or Magnetometry equipment. Geophysical surveys are an excellent tool to help define, manage, and protect burial grounds. This grant can fund the survey of an area up to one acre in size and can include both marked and unmarked burial grounds. The maximum grant amount is \$5,000. The final deliverable will be a small report

including the images and interpretation, but it does not cover verification of identified anomalies. Applications are due April 30, 2023, with notification to applicants on June 1, 2023.


