Presentation, CTDOT Current & Future EVSE Installations: Robert Bell

- CTDOT Headquarters have installed five charging installations for fleet, employees, and general public
 - All Level 2 chargers
 - Currently have 7 EV in their fleet
 - Have installed charging stations in New Haven and Thomaston
- Public Transportation:
 - 11 Battery Electric Buses
 - Bus Deports in construction in two municipalities
 - Level 2 chargers at multiple train stations
 - 5 service plazas also have charging stations
- Several more charging stations are in the project design process
- The fire on one electric bus has not delayed projects, there the fire is under review

Presentation, Comprehensive Energy Strategy: Becca Trietch

- Federal funding (IRA and IIJA) has provided significant opportunities
 - Majority in the form of tax credits, but there are substantial opportunities through the EPA and USDA
 - $\circ~$ EPA funding will begin being allocated as early as February
 - \circ $\,$ To keep updated, the Federal Register can be very useful, as can Energy.gov $\,$

- Building out stakeholder engagement for Comprehensive Energy Strategy
 - Committed thus far to technical sessions
 - Written comment opportunities are occurring, and they are endeavoring to make them as accessible as possible to communities
 - Expanding stakeholder forums could be a good strategy
 - $\circ~$ In 2023, they will draft CES
- Energy conservation and clean energy development plans in Bridgeport aligned with DOE priorities
- Began by creating partnerships
 - Developed Bridgeport Regional Energy Partnership (BREP)
 - Comprised of 45 members from all-communities in Bridgeport
 - Created community outreach plan in collaboration with community stakeholders and leadership members
- 9 elements of LEAP's scope of work (selection below)
 - o Includes community outreach
 - Near-term community driven projects (environmental justice)
 - Community capacity cataloging and gaps assessment
 - Renewable energy tech workshops to inform communities what is available
- Notes they are hiring for a Community Engagement Coordinator

Presentation, USDOE Communities Local Energy Action Program (LEAP) -

Bridgeport: Adrienne Farrar Houel

- One of only 24 cities across the nation that received this opportunity
- Presented proposal to DOE about "Little Liberia" in the South End of Bridgeport, which has resiliency concerns
- Justice 40 gave strength to their proposal
- Bridgeport suffers from energy burden (50% of households), which is exacerbated by the volume of low-income communities (75%)
