Welcome and Announcements

Rebecca A. French, Office of Climate Planning, Department of Energy and Environmental Protection

Rebecca French began by reviewing the agenda, which includes a presentation, followed by two breakout sessions: 1) Mitigation 2) Adaptation and resilience, a pilot of a new online tool called "Google JamBoard", and at the end there will be time for hearing public comments.

Rebecca French provided a brief overview of the Governor's Council on Climate Change (GC3). Overview and summary can be found <u>here</u>. The GC3 process has been ongoing since December of 2019 and is in a period of public review from September 22nd to October 21st. Following the conclusion of the public review period, the working groups will consider public feedback and revise their reports before sending them to the council. The final report and recommendations will be submitted to the governor by January 15, 2021.

The GC3 is continuing until the end of 2021. Phase 1 involves initial recommendations to the governor by January 15, 2021. The recommendations will include an evaluation of the progress towards the implementation of mitigation strategies in the 2018 GC3 report and updated recommendations for adapting to and improving the state's resilience to the effects of climate change.

Phase 2 is a final report and recommendations, which will conclude on December 31 2021. There will be a focus on robust public participation and engagement process, targeting feedback from environmental justice communities. An annual update to the recommendations for mitigation strategies. The development of a strategic statewide Adaptation and Resilience Plan.

Rebecca French offered several conversation prompts to discuss during the break out sessions.

Mitigation Break Out

If you could only make one recommendation to Governor Lamont related to mitigation of carbon emissions what would it be and why?

- Connecticut has made a commitment to a 45% reduction in emissions by 2030
- The 2030 target puts us on the path to reach the 2050 target which is an 80% reduction in emissions
- Additional questions to ask in the mitigation break out session are listed on presenter slides

Adaptation and Resilience Objective Break Out

If you could make one recommendation to Governor Lamont related to adapting to the impacts of climate change what would it be and why?

- It is important to think from this adaptation and resilience perspective because Connecticut's climate has already changed and will continue to change
- Additional questions to ask in the adaptation and resilience break out session are listed on presenter slides

Participants of the public forum were then moved into separate break out session rooms to discuss the two break out topics.

Public Comment

Lisa Candels:

I'm the clinical supervisor of a home visiting program serving pregnant women and their families. There are many immigrant families coming from southern countries, due to extreme poverty, impacted by the climate crisis. I feel that the climate crisis is a huge public health issue that needs to be addressed with as much seriousness and concern as the focus on the current pandemic. The pandemic is showing us how fast humans can adapt and we need to bring that mindset to the issue of the climate crisis.

Diane Hoffman:

I would like to see the public utility regulatory authority and the Connecticut Siting Council involved in this process. They are incredibly powerful it's important that they be much more accessible and accountable to the people. I think really good things are happening with PURA and that is the right direction to be going in. They are much more responsive under the new chairperson. I would also like to see the Connecticut Siting Council, because in my town, Hamden, we generally feel like it doesn't matter what we do, we have no power. It would be really good to have a human face on that group and really feel like what the community is saying and the concerns and objections and evidence that we're providing on a given project is seriously considered. Because the impression we have is that it doesn't matter how good our presentations are, it's kind of like a done deal. I would just like to see those two organizations or bodies be a part of this process.

Hugh Birdsall:

Public education and carbon sequestration are two things that have been missing from these forums. We don't have time to focus on reforestation in Connecticut for carbon sequestration. Instead, we must focus our attention on the tropics and pay them for reforestation. It's going to cost a lot but it will be worth it and we only have 10 years.

Patrick Comins:

Directed at the Science and Technology working group. A key recommendation is that we need to work with our federal elected officials and federal agency officials to come up with innovative approaches to both mitigation and adaptation. We need a Manhattan style project investment in this issue if we are going to help address it.

Allen Kratz:

I appreciate that fact that we had this opportunity to test out the Jamboard tool. I'm impressed that Connecticut is pursuing different ways of engaging the public during this prolonged period of pandemic and is helping to prevent us from needing to have onsite meetings. The Jamboard tool is fascinating. There are a few tweaks that can be made but it can be used. The Massachusetts Municipal Vulnerability Program put out a guide to doing virtual meetings today that I posted in the chat. I just want to validate and appreciate what you've done in Connecticut in that sense.

Gioia Connell:

It is pretty clear that reevaluating implementing stretch codes in a way that ensures equity across the state is going to be really critical in order to reach the 34% reduction in the carbon emissions from the governor's executive order.

Rebecca French adjourned the meeting.
