Welcome	The meeting was convened at 1:35 p.m.
Approve Minutes of the December 7, 2011 Meeting	Laura Gonzalez moved approval of the December 7, 2011 meeting minutes and the motion was seconded by Shirley Bergert. The motion was approved on a voice vote.
FFY 2012 LIHEAP Update	DSS reported on the administration of the CEAP through January 3, 2012: • 69,498 applications taken • 51,809 eligible applicants • 10,513 denied applications • 7,176 applications pending certification • 29,099 crisis assistance • 2,174 Safety Net DSS reviewed the Caseload and Eligible Caseload Comparison charts thru January 3. The caseload comparison chart showed a -21.0% change in the caseload and the Eligible Caseload comparison chart showed a -25.5% change from the same time a year ago. The program started one month later than last year, which attributes to the percent change in caseloads.
	Based on increased federal funds for LIHEAP, Connecticut may receive a total of \$79.5 million, which is \$17.9 million more

than was originally projected in the allocation plan approved by the legislature. As requested by legislators, the administration sent the following recommendations for use of additional funds to the chairs and co-chairs of the appropriations, human services and energy and technology committees for review and approval. Proposed additional funding will be used to provide:

- A \$140 supplemental payment to utility heated households
- An additional safety net benefit of \$400 to CEAP eligible deliverable heated households
- An extension to the intake end date from March 1 to May 1 (May 15 for utility heated customers with disconnect notices, consistent with prior years.

The board discussed in length these recommendations and expressed the following concerns with the proposal:

- Disparity in this year's energy assistance benefits between utility heated and deliverable fuel heated households.
- Low benefit levels
- Limited federal and state funding.

Shirley Bergert motion to submit recommendations to the legislative committees of cognizance urging them to:

- Immediately adopt implementation of the administration's proposal.
- Address disparities by increasing basic benefits equal to the 2010-2011 level should additional federal funds become available.
- In the event that additional federal funds are not allocated, consider the use of state-appropriated funds to increase the basic benefits equal to 2010-2011 level.

	Urge the committees to hold a public hearing to address the basic benefit disparity and the appropriation of state funds.
	The motion was seconded by David Thomas and approved on a voice vote with one abstention by the Commission on Aging. The Department of Social Services and the Office of Policy and Management opposed the motion.
	Other discussion topics related to the LIHEAP included: • Deb Polun will draft and circulate proposed statutory language to amend the minimum oil delivery requirement for households. • Shirley Bergert will work with Tom O'Brien and other interested parties to develop recommendations on implementing a pilot program requiring deliverable households to participate in a co-payment program.
Update on the PURA Consumer Service Unit	Michael Coyle gave an update on the status of the PURA Consumer Service Unit. PURA is currently working on restructuring the Consumer Service Unit to better serve consumers. PURA is collaborating with Info-Line to develop a system by which Info-Line will be used as an initial contact to screen inquiries and make referrals to PURA and other appropriate programs and services. PURA and/or Info-Line will provide an update at the February meeting.
Weatherization Program 2013 Plan Update	Michael reported that the US Department of Energy has yet to release the allocation levels for the non-AARA Weatherization Program. An update will be provided at the February meeting.

Dear Co-Chairs of the Legislative Committees of Cognizance,

As you may know, the recent omnibus appropriations bill includes increased funding for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). Based on the projections provided by the Congressional Research Service, it is expected that Connecticut will receive a total of \$79.5 million in LIHEAP funding, which is \$17.9 million more than was originally assumed in the allocation plan approved by the legislature.

As a result of this additional funding, we are proposing: (1) a \$140 supplemental payment to utility heated households; (2) an additional safety net benefit of \$400 to CEAP eligible deliverable fuel heated households; and (3) extending the end date for intake from March 15 to May 1 (May 15 for utility heated customers with disconnect notices), consistent with prior years. To ensure that any additional benefits are targeted to those most in need and also meaningful, we are not recommending any changes to the benefits already approved for households served under the Contingency Heating Assistance Program.

I have attached our proposed FFY 2012 LIHEAP Projections/Benefits for your review and consideration as was requested by the committees in September. Because we want to proceed to implementation as quickly as possible to ensure that Connecticut's most vulnerable residents have access to needed fuel as this winter progresses, please advise me at your earliest convenience regarding the results of your review and consideration of the revised plan.



Dear Co-Chair of the Legislative Committees of Cognizance,

On behalf of the Low-Income Energy Advisory Board (LIEAB), we recommend that the committees adopt the proposed 2012 Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) Projections/Benefits submitted to you by Secretary Barnes of the Office of Policy and Management on December 23, 2011.

This proposal details the use of the anticipated increase of \$17.9 million in federal funds for the Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP). The Advisory Board urges the committees to adopt implementation of the proposal immediately to allow the program to continue to operate efficiently without any interruption of services and to meet the needs of our most vulnerable residents.

In addition, the Advisory Board recognizes the disparity in this year's energy assistance benefits between utility heated and deliverable fuel heated households and believes that it is imperative that a meaningful level of equity of benefits be provided to those utility heated and deliverable fuel heated households that are struggling economically. In order to address the disparity, the Board recommends:

- Increasing basic benefits equal to the 2010-2011 level should additional federal funds become available; and,
- In the event that additional federal funds are not allocated, consider the use of state-appropriated funds to increase the basic benefits equal to 2010-2011 level.

In conclusion, the Advisory Board urges the committees to immediately adopt the submitted LIHEAP Projections/Benefits. In addition, we are encouraging the committees to hold a public hearing to address the basic benefit disparity and the appropriation of state funds.

Thank you for your December 23, 2011 letter regarding the anticipated increase of \$17.9 million in federal funding for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).

We have reviewed your proposed allocation of these funds and concur with your recommendations. However, we remain concerned about the disparity between utility heated and deliverable fuel heated households. We plan to pursue, with the Human Services and Energy & Technology Committees, the request of the Low Income Energy Assistance Advisory Board for a hearing on the disparity issue in the coming weeks. It is our hope that we can continue to have conversations on this issue, particularly if additional federal funds become available.
