Welcome	The meeting was convened at 1:35 p.m. by Pamela Trotman. She noted that the Chair was unable to attend due to a conflicting meeting. Council members introduced themselves.
Approve Minutes of the February 1, 2012 Meeting	Brenda Watson moved approval of the February 1, 2012 meeting minutes and the motion was seconded by Eddie Swift. The motion was approved on a voice vote.
FFY 2012 LIHEAP Update	Pamela Trotman distributed the Proposed Substitute Bill No. 5445, An Act Concerning Supplemental Payments under the Connecticut Energy Assistance Program and asked for the board support on the proposed bill. After a brief discussion, the board requested clarification on the intent and purpose of the bill before supporting the bill. DSS reported on the administration of the CEAP through April 4, 2012:

DSS informed the community action agencies to begin the utility program payments. Supplemental payments in the amount of \$200 will be issued within the next week.

Weatherization Program 2013 Plan Update

DEEP, reported that DOE announced a \$1.3M funding amount for Connecticut on February 9, 2012. DEEP subsequently modified its WAP Plan for the program year beginning April 1, 2102. Details of that plan were provided to LIEAB members, and a noticed hearing conducted on February 29th for the purpose of receiving public comment on the plan. DOE has since issued a conditional approval for 2012-2013 program year fund release. Several program details are near closure, including the program transition from DSS to DEEP, execution of contracts with

	the CAAs, and a second public comment hearing to be held at DEEP April 23rd. DSS reported that the AARA Weatherization Program has been extended to December 2012. This is a no cost extension. The program exceeded its goal of 7,500 units by weatherizing over 11,000 units. DSS expects to complete close to 14,000 units by the end of
	the program. DSS is working to complete all work by September 2012 to allow adequate time to close out the program.
	The board agreed to establish a working group to begin to develop recommendations for the 2012-2103 CEAP. Lindsay Parke agreed to coordinate the meeting. Members interested in joining the group will contact Lindsay directly. The group plans to meet later in the month.
Operation Fuel	Operation Fuel reported on its 2011-2012 Residential Program. 3200 household were served with at \$1.6M.

Recommended principles for developing the energy assistance program for winter 2012-13:

1. Eligibility income limit: remain at 60% SMI

2. Asset limits: retain current asset limits

3. Benefits:

- a. Retain LIHEAP benefit for SNAP recipient households who do not make direct vendor payments for their primary source of heat and have a shelter and/or utility obligation, and add a category for SNAP eligible households with assets that exceed program limits
- b. Treat highest benefit level category as "basic" benefit within the meaning of Conn. Gen. Stat. §16a-41a and provide equitable benefits regardless of heat source
- c. In establishing benefit levels for each income category, move to a structure that generally follows the relative benefit levels by income for LIHEAP plans prior to the 2011/2012 allocation plan
- d. Simplify benefit levels by combining basic and crisis benefits and provide these benefits equitably to program beneficiaries, regardless of heat source
- e. Provide one safety-net benefit to deliverable fuel households, using risk assessment tool
 - 1. Risk assessment tool should be modified to allow for transportation expenses similar to the below budget worksheet (\$400 if car is owned, or \$90 for other households)
- f. Treat households with a child under 6 years as "vulnerable" in all income categories that differentiate benefits based on the presence of a vulnerable household member
- g. Provide a meaningful (not nominal) benefit to households with heat included in the rental payment

4. Administration:

- a. Intake and application processing:
 - 1. Dates for intake: August 1 through current deadline (May 1 generally and May 15 for utility heated households with a shut-off notice)
 - 2."1st come, 1st served" applies to CAA intake appointment scheduling and application processing with no distinction between utility and deliverable fuel heated households
 - i. Exception: application taken and processed immediately for a household without or within one week of being without needed deliverable fuel

- ii. Beneficiary award letters should include information on additional available benefits and how to access such benefits (e.g., crisis and safety-net)
- iii. Zero income households should not be asked to provide proof they do not receive unemployment compensation (CT DOL does not provide such documentation in its administration of UC and no other source of such proof is available)

b. CAA and intake site issues:

- 1. Define and require CAA training of volunteer energy assistance intake sites
- 2. Prohibit any requirement that voluntary intake sites complete CAA forms not specific to the energy assistance program
- 3. Provide every voluntary intake site, before intake begins, with a knowledgeable CAA contact person who is readily available and can effectively address questions and concerns regarding energy assistance intakes and processing
- c. **Vendor issues:** Modify vendor contracts to prohibit:
 - 1. vendor delivery tickets from identifying households as energy assistance recipients, and
 - 2. vendors from requiring energy assistance recipients to engage in a credit check as a condition of delivery of fuel paid for by the energy assistance program.

5. Coordination with other assistance:

- a. Pursue DSS adding authorization, on all application and redetermination forms it utilizes for administering cash, food and medical assistance, to provide information to sources of energy and weatherization/conservation assistance and protections (e.g., moratorium) to facilitate provision of benefits and ensure protections, and collect utility company name and account numbers to allow for electronic information transfers for these purposes
- Handle matching payment program processing at the time of the energy assistance application intake for utility heated households and develop systems to ensure referrals for conservation assistance and available protections
- c. Pursue system of ready access to utility company account information via an online portal to facilitate efficient processing of matching payment program forms
