A. With the agreement of Quick Stop Food Mart, LLC ("Respondent"), the Commissioner of Environmental Protection ("Commissioner") finds the following:

1. Respondent owns, leases, operates, or controls a gasoline dispensing facility ("facility") at 618 Blue Hills Avenue in Hartford, Connecticut.
2. At the facility, gasoline is dispensed from the stationary storage tank(s) into the fuel tanks of motor vehicles. Such gasoline is transferred using a *Stage II vapor recovery system* ("Stage II system"). A properly operating Stage II system is required by Section 22a-174-30(b)(5) of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies ("Regulations").
3. Pursuant to Section 22a-174-30(e)(2) of the Regulations, a Stage II test is required to be conducted and approved to verify that the Stage II system is properly operating.
4. Pursuant to Section 22a-174-30(e)(4) of the Regulations, a station that has not passed the Stage II test is not considered to be properly operating.
5. The Respondent was required to conduct and pass such testing requirements by March 20th, 2011.
6. The Respondent conducted and passed a Stage II test on May 23rd, 2011; therefore, was approximately two (2) months late.
7. At the facility, gasoline is also transferred between fuel delivery vehicle(s) and stationary storage tank(s) using a *Stage I vapor recovery system*; as it is defined in Section 22a-174-30(a)(8) of the Regulations.
8. Pursuant to Section 22a-174-30(c)(6)(A) of the Regulations, "...no owner or operator of a gasoline-dispensing facility shall transfer or allow the transfer of gasoline between a delivery vehicle and a stationary storage tank unless each stationary storage tank is equipped with a CARB-certified fill adapter". This equipment was required to be installed by May 10th, 2005.

9. Pursuant to Section 22a-174-30(f) of the Regulations, the facility must maintain records including, but not limited to: all licenses to construct or operate the dispensing facility, all records and results of tests performed, records of any maintenance or repair conducted on any part of the Stage II vapor recovery system, proof that a current representative of the dispensing facility received training pursuant to sub-section 22a-174-40(d) of the Regulations, a chronological file of all inspection reports issued by the Department of Environmental Protection, Department of Consumer Protection, or Environmental Protection Agency, and a chronological file of all compliance records, including orders, warnings and notices of violations, issued by the Department of Environmental Protection, Department of Consumer Protection, or Environmental Protection Agency. Such records are to be made available for inspection and copying by a representative of the Department of Environmental Protection, Department of Consumer Protection, or Environmental Protection Agency and shall be maintained for five (5) years from the date of creation.
 10. A March 5th, 2011 inspection by Joseph Hukill, of the Department's Air Engineering & Enforcement Division, revealed that the Respondent had neither installed, on the "Super" grade stationary storage tank(s), the vapor recovery equipment specified in paragraph A.8. of this Consent Order nor kept records as specified in paragraph A.9. of this Consent Order.
 11. By virtue of the above, the Respondent violated Section 22a-174-30(b)(5), Section 22a-174-30(c)(6)(A), Section 22a-174-30(f), and Section 22a-174-30(e)(4) of the Regulations.
- B. With the agreement of the Respondent, the Commissioner, pursuant to Sections 22a-6, 22a-171, 22a-174, 22a-177, and 22a-178 of the Connecticut General Statutes, orders as follows:
1. Stage I Equipment. Within forty-five (45) days of the issuance of this Consent Order, the Respondent shall install the required equipment identified in paragraph A.8. of this Consent Order in accordance with Section 22a-174-30(c)(6)(A) of the Regulations. Within seven (7) days after completing such installation, the Respondent shall notify the Commissioner in writing.
 2. Record Keeping. Within forty-five (45) days of the issuance of this Consent Order, the Respondent shall have complete facility records in accordance with Section 22a-174-30(f) of the Regulations available for inspection at a location in Connecticut. The address at which the records are maintained shall be posted in a conspicuous location at the dispensing facility.
 3. Civil penalty. The Respondent shall pay a penalty of \$5,718.75 as the total civil penalty to be sought by the Commissioner for those, and only those, violations described in Paragraph A.11. of this Consent Order. The Respondent shall submit an initial payment in the amount of \$1443.75 on or before thirty (30) days after issuance of this Consent Order. The Respondent shall submit the remainder of the penalty in accordance with the following payment schedule: Submit payments in the amount of \$1425.00 every three (3) months, beginning three (3) months after the initial payment, until the civil penalty is paid in full.

4. Full compliance. The Respondent shall not be considered in full compliance with this Consent Order until all actions required by this Consent Order have been completed as approved and to the Commissioner's satisfaction.
5. Payment of penalties. Payment of penalties under this Consent Order shall be mailed or personally delivered to Bureau of Financial and Support Services--Accounts Receivable Office ["F&SS"]. Department of Environmental Protection, 79 Elm Street, Hartford, CT 06106-5127, and shall be by certified or bank check payable to the Treasurer, State of Connecticut. The check shall state on its face, "Bureau of Air Management Civil Penalty, Air Engineering & Enforcement Division, Consent Order No. 2256".
6. Approvals. The Respondent shall use best efforts to submit to the Commissioner all documents required by this Order in a complete and approvable form. If the Commissioner notifies the Respondent that any document or other action is deficient, and does not approve it with conditions or modifications, it is deemed disapproved, and the Respondent shall correct the deficiencies and resubmit it within the time specified by the Commissioner or, if no time is specified by the Commissioner, within 30 days of the Commissioner's notice of deficiencies. In approving any document or other action under this Consent Order, the Commissioner may approve the document or other action as submitted or performed or with such conditions or modifications as the Commissioner deems necessary to carry out the purposes of this Consent Order. Nothing in this paragraph shall excuse noncompliance or delay.
7. Definitions. As used in this Consent Order, "Commissioner" means the Commissioner or a representative of the Commissioner.
8. Dates. The date of "issuance" of this consent order is the date the consent order is deposited in the U.S. mail or personally delivered, whichever is earlier. The date of submission to the Commissioner of any document required by this consent order shall be the date such document is received by the Commissioner. The date of any notice by the Commissioner under this consent order, including but not limited to notice of approval or disapproval of any document or other action, shall be the date such notice is deposited in the U.S. mail or is personally delivered, whichever is earlier. Except as otherwise specified in this consent order, the word "day" as used in this consent order means calendar day. Any document or action which is required by this consent order to be submitted or performed by a date which falls on a Saturday, Sunday or a Connecticut or federal holiday shall be submitted or performed by the next day which is not a Saturday, Sunday or Connecticut or federal holiday.
9. Certification of documents. Any document, including but not limited to any notice, which is required to be submitted to the Commissioner under this Consent Order shall be signed by the Respondent or, if the Respondent is not an individual, by the Respondent's chief executive officer or a duly authorized representative of such officer, as those terms are defined in §22a-430-3(b)(2) of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies, and by the individual(s) responsible for actually preparing such document, and the Respondent or the Respondent's chief executive officer and each such individual shall certify in writing as

follows: "I have personally examined and am familiar with the information submitted in this document and all attachments thereto, and I certify, based on reasonable investigation, including my inquiry of those individuals responsible for obtaining the information, that the submitted information is true, accurate and complete to the best of my knowledge and belief. I understand that any false statement made in the submitted information is punishable as a criminal offense under Section §53a-157b of the Connecticut General Statutes and any other applicable law."

10. Noncompliance. This Consent Order is a final order of the Commissioner with respect to the matters addressed herein, and is nonappealable and immediately enforceable. Failure to comply with this Consent Order may subject the Respondent to an injunction and penalties.
11. False statements. Any false statement in any information submitted pursuant to this consent order may be punishable as a criminal offense under §53a-157b of the Connecticut General Statutes and any other applicable law.
12. Notice of transfer; liability of Respondent. Until the Respondent has fully complied with this Consent Order, Respondent shall notify the Commissioner in writing no later than 15 days after transferring all or any portion of the facility, the operations, the site or the business which is the subject of this Consent Order or after obtaining a new mailing or location address. The Respondent's obligations under this Consent Order shall not be affected by the passage of title to any property to any other person or municipality.
13. Commissioner's powers. Except as provided hereinabove with respect to payment of civil penalties, nothing in this Consent Order shall affect the Commissioner's authority to institute any proceeding or take any other action to prevent or abate violations of law, prevent or abate pollution, recover costs and natural resource damages, and to impose penalties for past, present, or future violations of law. If at any time the Commissioner determines that the actions taken by Respondents pursuant to this Consent Order have not successfully corrected all violations, fully characterized the extent or degree of any pollution, or successfully abated or prevented pollution, the Commissioner may institute any proceeding to require the Respondents to undertake further investigation or further action to prevent or abate violations or pollution.
14. Respondent's obligations under law. Nothing in this Consent Order shall relieve the Respondent of other obligations under applicable federal, state and local law.
15. No assurance by Commissioner. No provision of this Consent Order and no action or inaction by the Commissioner shall be construed to constitute an assurance by the Commissioner that the actions taken by the Respondent pursuant to this Consent Order will result in compliance.
16. Access to site. Any representative of the Department of Environmental Protection may enter the facility without prior notice for the purposes of monitoring and enforcing the actions required or allowed by this Consent Order.

17. No effect on rights of other persons. This Consent Order neither creates nor affects any rights of persons or municipalities that are not parties to this Consent Order.
18. Notice to Commissioner of changes. Within 15 days of the date the Respondent becomes aware of a change in any information submitted to the Commissioner under this Consent Order, or that any such information was inaccurate or misleading or that any relevant information was omitted, the Respondent shall submit the correct or omitted information to the Commissioner.
19. Notification of noncompliance. In the event that the Respondent becomes aware that it did not or may not comply, or did not or may not comply on time, with any requirement of this Consent Order or of any document required hereunder, the Respondent shall immediately notify by telephone the individual identified in the next paragraph and shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that any noncompliance or delay is avoided or, if unavoidable, is minimized to the greatest extent possible. Within five (5) days of the initial notice, the Respondent shall submit in writing the date, time and duration of the noncompliance and the reasons for the noncompliance or delay and propose, for the review and written approval of the Commissioner, dates by which compliance will be achieved, and the Respondent shall comply with any dates which may be approved in writing by the Commissioner. Notification by the Respondent shall not excuse noncompliance or delay, and the Commissioner's approval of any compliance dates proposed shall not excuse noncompliance or delay unless specifically so stated by the Commissioner in writing.
20. Submission of documents. Any document required to be submitted to the Commissioner under this Consent Order, unless otherwise specified in this Consent Order or in writing by the Commissioner, shall be directed to:


