# PROPOSED RSRs - NEXT STEPS

- 1. Public "Notice of Intent to Amend Regulations and hold a Public Hearing" published in the CT Law Journal *Completed 08/21/12*
- 2. DEEP informational meetings *Completed 9/20/12* and 9/26/12
- 3. Public Hearing oral and written testimony accepted on RSR amendments; Record Closed *Completed 10/25/12*
- 4. Hearing Report final proposed regulations and fiscal note prepared by DEEP *In Process*



#### PROPOSED RSRs – NEXT STEPS

- 5. Final proposed Regulations and associated documents submitted to Commissioner for approval
- 6. DEEP notifies all interested parties (Hearing commenters) of decision to take action on regulations and availability of final wording
- 7. DEEP submits final regulations to Attorney General for "Legal Sufficiency" approval per CGS 4-169



#### PROPOSED RSRs – NEXT STEPS

- 8. DEEP submits final regulations to Office of Fiscal Analysis and Comm. of Cognizance (Environment Committee)
- 9. DEEP submits final regulations for approval to LRRC per CGS 4-170
- 10. Regulations filed with Secretary of State Office per CGS 4-172 (Regulations final upon Filing)
- 11. Publication of Regulations in the CT Law Journal

Rate of Funding Inadequate to Maintain Present Program




No Eligibility Differential between Small and Large Station Applicants






#### PROGRAM FUNDING HISTORY (FY1991 – FY2013)





#### CURRENT PROGRAM APPLICANT UNIVERSE





\*Top Five Largest Applicants @ 71%

# PROGRAM TRANSITION

FROM	TO
No distinction (large vs. small station applicants)	Distinction (small, municipality, offsite 3 <sup>rd</sup> party = faster payment and longer access to fund)
Payment (oldest awards paid first)	Option to obtain faster payment with reduced payment
No funding plan	\$36M of funding for next 4 years
No future change	Program phased out with sunset dates



#### NO DISTINCTION TO CLEAR DISTINCTION

Municipalities, Third Parties, Small Station Applicants distinct from Mid-size and Large Station Applicants concerning eligibility and payment

- Distinction determined by number of UST sites owned/operated
  - Small Station applicant = five or less owned/operated UST sites at the time of their first application to Program



#### NEW PAYMENT PRIORITIZATION

First Come First Serve for Municipalities,
 Small & Off-site 3<sup>rd</sup> Parties

- Mid-size and Large Station Applicants Annual Competitive Bid Process For All Future Payments
  - DEEP developing payment election auction
     process = faster payment for applicants electing
     reduced payment



#### PROGRAM SUNSET DATES

- Applications must be submitted before:
  - Oct. 1, 2012 for Large Station Applicants
  - Oct. 1, 2013 for Mid-size Station Applicants for releases reported before Oct. 1, 2012
  - Oct. 1, 2014 for Small Station, Municipal, and
     Other Applicants for releases reported before Oct.
     1, 2013



#### PROGRAM SUNSET DATES

- Program expires as a financial responsibility mechanism on:
  - Oct. 1, 2012 for owners/operators with USTs on more than 5 separate parcels of property
  - Oct 1, 2013 for everyone else
- An applicant's size category is not utilized concerning this sunset provision



#### APPLICANT CATEGORY DETERMINATION

- Commissioner can not order payment to an applicant without receipt of form and completing category determination
- DEEP has sent prefilled category determination forms to applicants that have pending payment and/or applications
- Form requests information to determine applicant's category (small, mid-size, or large station applicant)
- Commissioner sends category determination response letter to applicant



#### PAYMENT REDUCTION ELECTION

- DEEP-approved payment reduction election form to be sent to Mid-size and Large Station Applicants
- Applicant makes an annual payment reduction election
- Option to obtain faster payment with reduced payment
- Cannot change a reduced payment election
   except with lower payments

#### APPROVAL OF APPLICATIONS

# DEEP Commissioner administers program in lieu of UST Review Board

Staff to approve applications and consent items on weekly or bi-weekly basis

Management considers contested applications/ applicant has opportunity to meet with management

Approved applications go directly into queue for payment

# **CLEANUP TRANSFORMATION**

 Public Act No. 12-196 requires DEEP to submit a report to the Governor and Legislature by January 1, 2013

Report will address statutory and regulatory changes and/or new frameworks

Stakeholder process will continue to be active

Low risk sites can be ensnared in the net






Holds on to those in the system tightly

#### DRAFT PROPOSED PROGRAM OUTLINE

- DEEP released the Program Outline on 9/27/12
- External Transformation Workgroups formed 10/9/12 to help provide specific feedback to DEEP on six topics:
  - 1. Liability
  - 2. Reportable Releases
  - 3. Early Exits
  - 4. Transition
  - 5. RSRs Evaluation Soil and Sediment
  - 6. RSRs Evaluation Groundwater and NAPL




#### **NEW PROGRAM – MAJOR COMPONENTS**

- Release Reporting (who comes in)
- Early Exits (quick and easier compliance)
- Address imminent high risks (short-term risks)
- New Cleanup Exits (numerous selfimplementing and timely paths to A/B/C Exits)



#### BASIC STRUCTURE OF PROPOSED SYSTEM





### RELEASE REPORTING

- Reportable releases can either be new (spills) or old (historical releases)
  - Spills reported based on compound or substancespecific Reportable Quantity with risk-based exceptions
  - Historical releases reported based on a Reportable Concentration (taking into consideration current risk assumptions) or information of significant release where no lab data exists



### **EARLY EXITS**

- Exit from the program can be achieved with less effort if cleanup is completed quickly
  - New releases that don't pose significant risk to receptors
  - Possibly certain historical releases
- Reduced or no groundwater monitoring
- Exit could be certified by a party other than LEP



## IMPROVED REGULATIONS

- Regulations must provide quick and selfimplementable paths to reasonable exits
- DEEP held RSRs LEAN event this August
- Two workgroups currently looking at RSRs
- Based on many years of experience more comfort exists on what is not adding value and what is important



# STAKEHOLDER FEEDBACK

DEEP seeking public comment on Draft Program
 Outline document (released 9/27)

- 6 Transformation Workgroups compiling recommendations for DEEP (due 11/20)
  - Reports will be posted and DEEP will accept comments on these reports



### LIABILITY WORKGROUP

- Identify "responsibility", not just liability
  - Who must report and to whom
  - Who must investigate and remediate or address risks
- Historical Releases different than New Spills
  - Responsible Parties and Property Owners need to complete cleanup
  - Innocent Property Owners limited cleanup and liablity relief
  - Retroactivity of historical reporting



### REPORTABLE RELEASES WORKGROUP

- Two options for reporting new spills
  - 1. Universal trigger quantity models (exceptions to a higher or lower trigger quantity based on risks)
  - 2. Chemical specific reportable quantities (exceptions for imminent threats to human health or the environment)
- Two options for reporting historical releases
  - 1. Modification of Significant Environmental Hazard reporting to consider additional circumstances/scenarios
  - 2. Adoption of reportable concentration system similar to Massachusetts MCP using RSR criteria



### EARLY EXITS WORKGROUP

- All new spills and certain historical releases could close obligations if remediated within 90 days
- Discussion on what makes a historical release qualified to use early exits and if should there be different rules
- Certifications of achieving early exits should be guided by flow charts and checklists
- Discussion on who can certify and what the training requirements would be
- Discussion on what DEEP would do with certifications



### TRANSITION WORKGROUP

- Identified numerous issues and questions with transitioning sites in current programs (Transfer Act, Voluntary Program, RCRA Corrective Action, USTs, Spills, Significant Environmental Hazards) to unified program
  - recommendations are being developed
- Discussion on "closed" spills and active Remediation sites being required to enter into the new program
- Discussion on certain past obligations continuing / limiting reporting obligations





# RSRs SOIL/SEDIMENT WORKGROUP

- Default Exposure Criteria that fits between the RDEC and I/C DEC
- Self-implementing exposure controls (AULs) and risk-based, site-specific standards to fit site conditions
- Re-evaluate "inaccessible"
- Revisit derivation of PMC
- Re-evaluate implementation of PMC
- Expand self-implementing, site-specific performance evaluation based on property and groundwater use
- Clarify applicability and develop criteria
- Provide guidance
- Design RSRs to be self-implementing, except on large-scale or complex sites or sites where public policy warrants
- Develop tiered end points scoping, screening, site-specific LEP-lead off ramps

### RSRs GROUNDWATER WORKGROUP

- Modifications to increase compliance options through
  - Revising default criteria
  - Providing more compliance scenarios
  - Providing more ELUR options
  - Creating prescribed, self-implementing alternatives for sitespecific use
- Improve TI to be risk-based
- Include risk assessment as part of site-specific evaluation
- Identification of what is not working well Priority List
- Less DEEP approval



### REMAINING STEPS — FRAMEWORK REPORT

- DEEP to release draft proposal for new and revised statutory <u>and</u> regulatory framework
  - Anticipated in December
- Draft Framework will be based on process to date with special attention given to stakeholder feedback on Program Outline and Workgroup Reports



### REMAINING STEPS — DEEP REPORT

 Pursuant to Public Act No. 12-196 – DEEP to submit a report to the Governor and Legislature by January 1, 2013

- Report will address statutory and regulatory changes and/or new frameworks
- All public comments regardless of the form will be considered



## DEEP REPORT – OUTREACH

- DEEP will host a public meeting to present and receive verbal feedback on the DEEP Report
  - Meeting will be held in advance of the Legislative hearing on any proposed Bill
