

Sustainable Materials Management Grant Program

32 Applicants

5 were COGs or regional waste authorities

Proposals include:

- Town-wide or specific routes for Unit-Based Pricing (UBP) with food scrap collection
- Food scrap collection without UBP
- Regional support for UBP with food scrap collection
- Food scrap-processing infrastructure

Sustainable Materials Management Grant Program

Applicant Data

- 23 unit-based pricing (UBP) with food scrap collection/ diversion projects
 - 6 town-wide projects
 - 6 transfer station programs with food drop off and UBP
 - 11 food scrap co-collection or separate collection projects
- 9 food scrap collection only projects


Beverage Container Recycling Grant Program

Overview

- Grants available
 - \$150,000 cap removed (new)
- Target applicants:
 - New redemption centers
 - Existing redemption centers (new)
 - Locally-owned, minority-owned, womenowned
- Eligible locations:
 - Environmental justice communities
 - Urban centers
- Municipalities/COGs eligible to apply
- Application deadline extended through October 3, 2022 (new)

Bottle Bill Updates :

\$0.05 Fee on "Miniatures"

Overview

- Effective Oct. 1, 2021
- Wholesalers must assess a \$0.05 fee on all miniature alcohol bottles sold to retailers
- Revenues from the \$0.05 fee are disbursed by the Wine & Spirits Wholesalers of CT (WSWC) on behalf of wholesalers to municipalities each April and October (starting April 2022)

Bottle Bill Updates :

\$0.05 Fee on "Miniatures"

A reminder:

- Miniatures are not part of the deposit redemption system
- No state involvement aside from receiving semiannual report from wholesalers/WSWC

Bottle Bill Updates :

\$0.05 Fee on "Miniatures"

- How should these funds be used by municipalities?
 - Public Act 21-58 specifies that "All payments received by any municipality... shall be expended by such municipality on environmental measures intended to reduce the generation of solid waste in such municipality or reduce the impact of litter caused by such solid waste, including, but not limited to, the hiring of a recycling coordinator, the installation of storm drain filters designed to block solid waste and beverage container debris or the purchase of mechanical street sweeper, vacuum or broom that removes litter, including, but not limited to, such beverage containers and other debris from streets, sidewalks and abutting lawn and turf areas."

DEEP Solid Waste Permitting Updates – Appendix H: Food Waste

- The CCSMM menu of options identified the need for a network of facilities to feed into larger food waste processing facilities.
 - Streamlined permitting to develop infrastructure was identified as an action item for DEEP.
- Issued modified General Permit to Construct and Operate a Commercial Facility for the Management of Recyclable Materials and Certain Solid Wastes, including new appendix for food waste facilities.
 - Appendix H: Food Waste, issued January 13, 2022.
 - The General Permit, application and instructions can be found on the DEEP website here.

Commercial General Permit Appendix H: Food Waste

Provisions of Food Waste Facility Appendix :

- Two Subcategories:
 - Receipt, Storage, Transfer
 - Receipt, Storage, Transfer, and Limited Processing
- Two Tiers:
 - Sanitary operations, maintenance, and facility design conditions

Municipal Transfer Station General Permit

- The Municipal Transfer Station General Permit will expire on November 29, 2022.
- The Department plans to reissue the MTS General Permit this year.
 - Anticipates public notice of intent to reissue in mid 2022.
