The Council on Environmental Quality

In 1971, the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) was created to perform three primary functions:

- 1. Annually assess the condition of Connecticut's environment and report the findings to the Governor.
- 2. Advise other state agencies on the environmental impacts of proposed actions.
- 3. Investigate citizen inquiries, complaints, and allegations of violations of environmental laws





Background

 Public Act 21-58, Section 10 established a 5-cent surcharge on all miniature alcohol bottles of 50ml or less

- The surcharge took effect in October 2021
- Wholesalers collect the funds and distribute them back to the municipality of sale every April and October
- The Public Act was codified in CGS Sec. 22a-244b



Usage of Funds

CGS Section 22a-244b(d) states that the funds can be spent on environmental measures intended to:

- 1. Reduce the **generation** of solid waste
 - a. Hiring of a recycling coordinator

Examples

- b. Recycling equipment
- c. Educational Programs
- 2. Reduce the **impact** of litter:
 - a. Personnel costs to remove litter

Examples

b. Mechanical street sweepers, vacuums, or brooms



The Council's Role

 Public Act 23-76 requires the CEQ to conduct a review of the program pursuant to subsection (d) of section 22a-244b

• Starting on September 19, the Council surveyed 159 municipalities that received funds. The reporting period is from July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025.

91 out of 159 municipalities (57%) surveyed have responded so far.

Responses included funds spent, uses, and program feedback

This presentation reflects survey data received as of October 22.



Early Takeaways


- The 91 responses detailed how \$2,084,080 of NIPS funds were spent for the reporting period.
- The 66 municipalities that expended NIPS funds spent an average of \$3,1577.
- Purchases of mechanical equipment and support for personnel to reduce/collect litter were the most common expenditure. The purchase of storm drain filters was the least.
 - 26.6% (\$553,387) of funds were expended on mechanical equipment.
 - 25% (\$421,104) of funds were expended on support for personnel.
- So far, 15 respondents reported that the program was effective or very effective at reducing solid waste and/or litter. Three reported it was ineffective.




How CT Municipalities Expended Nips Funds on Measures to Reduce Litter (FY2024)
