WebEOC Basic Training

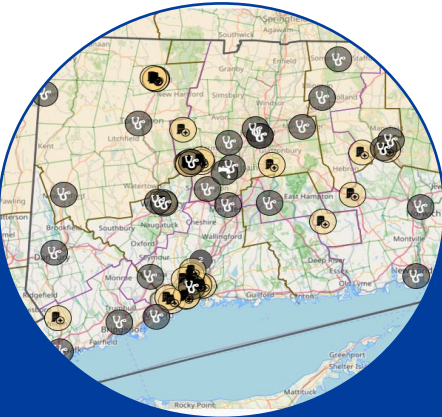
This course covers CT WebEOC Access and Credentials, the Shared Situational Awareness Carousel, Navigation and Data Analysis Tips / Tricks, Self-Learn Training, EOC Tools and ESF Resources, and Mobile App Setup.

This course is the prerequisite for all other WebEOC classes. Basic WebEOC courses taken before November 2024 no longer qualify individuals as fulfilling the prerequisites for other WebEOC courses. An active WebEOC account, functioning camera and microphone, and basic computer skills are prerequisites.

What is WebEOC?

WebEOC is a web-based emergency management information system used by the State of Connecticut to document routine and emergency events/incidents. WebEOC provides a real-time common operating picture and resource request management tool for emergency managers at the local and state levels during exercises, drills, local or regional emergencies, and/or statewide emergencies.

Test Your Credentials!

WebEOC User credentials should be tested regularly to prevent access issues before an emergency strikes.

Training Requirements

All WebEOC users are expected to seek training on the system and, periodically, repeat training to learn new or updated functions.

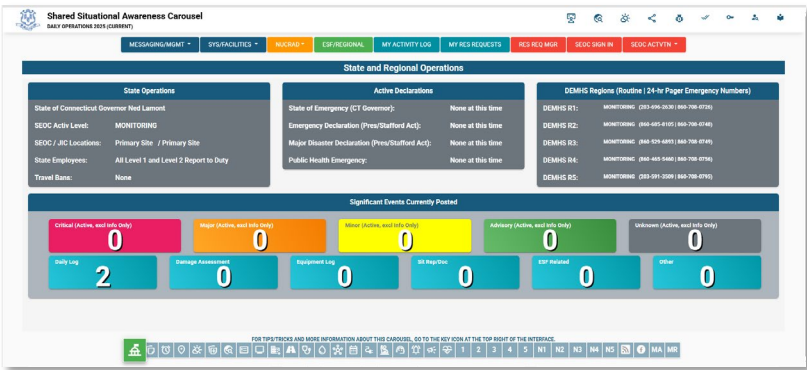

Domestic Violent Extremism | Targeted Violence and Prevention



What is Domestic Violent Extremism and Targeted Violence and Terrorism Prevention?

CT DEMHS maintains a robust TV and DVE curriculum under the **Threat Evaluation and Reporting Course (TERC) Suite**. CT DEMHS executes each of the TERC Suite classes under the auspices of the National Threat Evaluation and Reporting Office.

The **TERC Suite** teaches students to utilize a **four-step threat assessment model** to identify, investigate, assess, and manage an individual who presents behaviors of concern, and empower others with the tools to identify and report potential threats in their respective communities. Additionally, the TERC Suite prepares threat assessment teams to minimize potential threats of targeted violence and to effectively move concerning individuals off the pathway to violence and away from an attack.

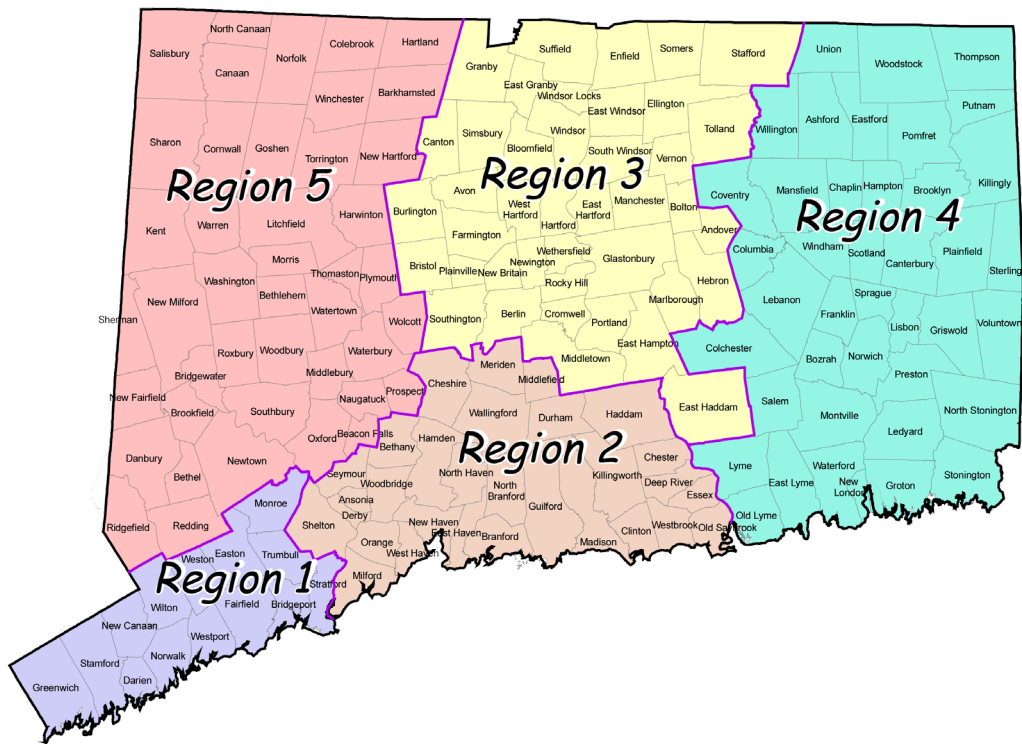
Incident Command System in Schools; Overview Program

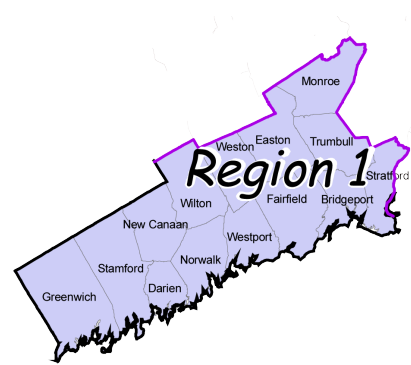

Regional Training Opportunities – Region 1



DEMHS Region 1, which encompasses fourteen (14) municipalities in Southwest Connecticut, is the gateway to the New York Metropolitan area from New England and home to commuters who work in the New York City Metropolitan area. According to 2020 DPH Statistics, the combined population of the 14 towns in Region 1 is 714,024 plus a substantial daily incoming commuting population. Additionally, the total land area of all the towns is 371 sq. miles. Region 1 contains one of the busiest transportation corridors in the country which includes I-95 and Metro North/Amtrak.

MGT-315: Conducting Risk Assessments for Critical Community Assets

This course teaches the critical components of risk management and provides participants the basic fundamentals of determining and mitigating risks associated with their critical infrastructure. This class combines lectures, facilitated discussions, group activities, and on-site, site-specific risk assessments of select local facilities

PER-211: Medical Management of Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosive (CBRNE) Events

This course provides a strong emphasis in developing a multi-discipline, whole-community team approach to planning, preparing, responding, managing, and recovering from an event involving CBRNE agents or an intentional hostile event.

MGT-439: Pediatric Disaster Response and Emergency

This course prepares students to effectively, appropriately, and safely plan for and respond to a disaster incident involving children, addressing the specific needs of pediatric patients in the event of a community based-incident through resource management.. Pediatric specific planning considerations include mass sheltering, pediatric-triage, reunification planning and pediatric decontamination considerations.

PER-275: Law Enforcement Active Shooter Emergency Response

Terrorism involving active shooter attacks on population centers has become part of law enforcement officers' awareness; however, increased awareness of a problem does not ensure preparedness or appropriate response tactics. This course addresses technical aspects of planning and implementing a rapid law enforcement deployment to an active shooter incident.

This five-day course serves as a basic introduction to the activities and processes of a Type 3 All-Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT), enabling them to be better prepared to support large scale or complex operations in their communities. This course meets the needs of the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and the National Response Framework (NRF) while focusing on the importance of developing and operating as a functional USFA Type 3 AHIMT and will assist individual responders to perform as viable team members.

Regional Training Opportunities – Region 3



DEMHS Region 3 is comprised of towns located within the northern central area of the State of Connecticut surrounding the capitol city of Hartford; the region is bisected by the Connecticut River and its tributaries. The forty-one (41) towns located in this region range from urban to rural. The municipalities that make up Region 3 have a total combined population of 1,085,939 according to 2017 DPH estimates within a land area of 1,078 sq. miles.

AWR-213: Critical Infrastructure Security and Resilience Awareness

This course will introduce participants to the key terms, policy, guidance, and preparedness efforts required to safeguard the Nation's critical infrastructure. Participants will discuss the risk management framework, describe Federal critical infrastructure security and resilience and information sharing programs, and relate critical infrastructure programs to individual actions.

MGT-310: Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment

This course introduces the six-step THIRA/SPR process which includes identifying threats and hazards that stress a community's capabilities, giving context to those threats and hazards and identifying associated impacts consistent with specific factors, identifying community-specific capability targets, assessing current levels of capability in comparison to those targets, identifying capability gaps and subsequent strategies to close those, and assessing and describing the impact of funding sources on building or sustaining capabilities in a community.

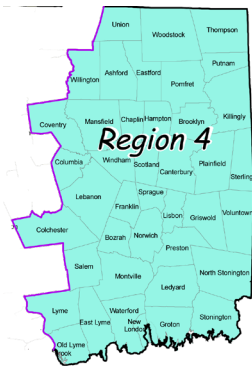

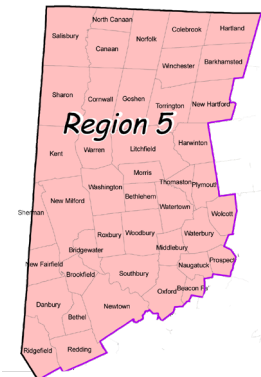

AWR 232 is an 8-hour, DHS/FEMA-certified, tuition-free, awareness-level course.
