Subject: Local Health Visits Reviewing Private Well Records

Over the last 9 months the Private Well Program has conducted random site visits of some Local Health Departments, Statewide. Below are some findings that we want to share with all Local Health authorities so that they may improve the private well approval process.

- Majority of Local Health Departments have a well-organized orderly private well approval process.
- For those of you not utilizing a <u>checklist</u> we suggest one be used to improve efficiency. This checklist should be permanently affixed to the homeowners address file. This would quickly provide an indication of what items are still outstanding.
- Many or you indicated a lack of coordination with the local building officials. We would suggest you meet with your local building officials and impress upon them the need to communicate private well approval process so that Certificates of Occupancy (C.O.) are not issued prematurely. A well permit and a satisfactory water quality report should be recorded prior to issuance of a C.O. pursuant to the International 2003 Plumbing Code (Chapter 2).
- We recognize and certainly appreciate the workload that Local Health Departments have, however, it is important that private well paper work (permit, water quality report and completion report) be in place. This is particularly important if water treatment maybe necessary.
- Well location variances, exceptions must not be given to new home sites.
- We strongly suggest that homeowners test for water quality parameters listed in Sec. 19-13-B101 of the Public Health Code after a well is deepened and/or hydrofracted. The quality of the well is likely to change and a new water quality test would be useful.
- Continue to utilize our webpage for the ever expanding array of information, not only useful to homeowners but to Local Health Officials.
- We are open to suggestions for outreach documents that you believe would be useful.
