



## Private Wells - in the State Water Plan

**Section 5 Plan Recommendations** (page 5-2)

#### 5.1 Future Water Data Needs:

"Implement a water quality testing and reporting program for private wells with automatic reporting to DPH and local health districts. Connecticut General Statutes Section 19a-37, subsection (b) requires submittal of water quality test results to DPH and the local health department when testing is done for a real estate transaction, but it may be valuable to consider more frequent/periodic testing."

- The Public Health Committee, Energy and Technology Committee, Environment Committee, and Planning and Development Committee will hold a joint public hearing on the Connecticut State Water Plan on Tuesday, April 17, 2018, from 11:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. in Room 2C of the LOB.
- The Committees are accepting electronic testimony via email at <a href="mailto:phtestimony@cga.ct.gov">phtestimony@cga.ct.gov</a>. Please submit electronic testimony in Word or PDF format no later than 2:00 P.M. on Friday, April 13, 2018. If you are unable to submit electronic testimony, please submit 30 copies of your written testimony no later than 9:30 A.M. on Tuesday, April 17, 2018 in Room 3000 of the LOB. Testimony submitted after the deadline will be made available to legislators after the hearing.
- Sign-up for the hearing will begin at 9:00 A.M. in the First Floor Atrium of the LOB. The first hour of the hearing is reserved for Legislators, Constitutional Officers, State Agency Heads and Chief Elected Municipal Officials. Speakers will be limited to three minutes of testimony. Unofficial sign-up sheets have no standing with the Committees.
