- Open Discussion Engaging the Governing Entity
 How is your health department engaging your governing entity?
 - LHDs engaged on the call described creating a powerpoint introduction to accreditation to present to staff and their board of health or municipal leaders. The governing entity is then updated periodically on the progress of the CHA/CHIP/SP and other accreditation activities
 - In convincing the governing entity of the benefits of seeking accreditation, LHDs have found some success in emphasizing the likelihood that future grant funding will be contingent on accreditation, as some grants are already requiring CHAs or CHIPs.
- Championing a Culture of Health Equity Across Policies, Planning, and Programming Incorporating Health Equity in programmatic work is an important component of accreditation. While many LHDs do so, it can be difficult to document. A first step to incorporating health equity is to include it as a strategic priority or strategic objective in your LHD's Strategic Plan and Map. From there, a work-plan will lay out the activities your department needs to take, such as creating policies, training staff on CLAS 101, and developing health equity criteria/impact guidance. Aligning your LHD's CHIP with health equity principles is also an important step as the CHIP often informs much of the programmatic work an agency might undertake. Performance measures should include health disparities to demonstrate a full picture of the health of residents.
