Outreach is an allowable administrative cost to SNAP. SNAP is not a match program in which every dollar of State agency funds is paired with a dollar of Food and Nutrition Service of the United States Department of Agriculture (FNS) funds to pay expenditures. It is a reimbursement program in which State agencies pay approved, reasonable and necessary administrative costs (including for outreach) and are reimbursed for 50 percent of those expenditures by FNS.

State SNAP agencies may hire a contractor to conduct the SNAP Outreach activities. The contractor must bill the State agency according to the terms of the contract and FNS will reimburse 50 percent of the State outlay.

At its discretion, the Department may distribute any amendments and addenda to this RFP to prospective respondents who submitted a Letter of Intent. **Proposals must include a signed Addendum Acknowledgement, which will be placed at the end of any and all addenda to this RFP.**

9. Proposal Due Date and Time. The Official Contact is the only authorized recipient of proposals submitted in response to this RFP. Proposals must be <u>received</u> by the Official Contact on or before the due date and time:

Due Date: <u>March 25, 2016</u>

• Time: 2:00 p.m. Eastern Time

Faxed or e-mailed proposals will not be evaluated. The Department shall not accept a postmark date as the basis for meeting the proposal due date and time. Respondents should not interpret or otherwise construe receipt of a proposal after the due date and time as acceptance of the proposal, since the actual receipt of the proposal is a clerical function. The Department suggests the Respondent use certified or registered mail, or a delivery service such as United Parcel Service (UPS) to deliver the proposal.

When hand-delivering proposals, submitters should allow extra time to comply with building security and delivery procedures.

Hand-delivered proposals must be delivered to the lobby at the DSS, 55 Farmington Avenue, Hartford, CT 06105-3730. Proceed to the security desk and the Official Contact or designee will be called to receive the submission and provide the Respondent or courier with a receipt. Visitor parking is available across the street from 55 Farmington Ave.

Proposals shall not be considered received by the Department until they are **in the hands** of the Official Contact or another representative of the Contract Administration and Procurement Unit designated by the Official Contact. At the discretion of the Department, late proposals may be destroyed or retained for pick-up by the submitters.

An acceptable submission must include the following:

- One (1) original proposal with original signatures;
- Three (3) conforming copies of the original proposal; and
- One (1) electronic copy of the original proposal on Compact Disk (CD) (no flash drives).

*Note Worthy: Flash drives are not acceptable. Hyperlinks referenced within proposals are not acceptable.

The original submission shall carry <u>original signatures</u> and be clearly marked on the cover as "Original." Unsigned submissions will not be evaluated. The original submission and each conforming copy of the submission shall be complete, properly formatted and outlined, and ready for evaluation by the Evaluation Team. <u>The</u> electronic copies of the submission shall be compatible with *Microsoft Office*

Word except for the Budget, which may be compatible with Microsoft Office Excel. For the electronic copy, only the required appendices and forms may be scanned and submitted in Portable Document Format (PDF) or similar file format.

10. Multiple Proposals. The submission of multiple proposals is not an option with this procurement.

D. PROPOSAL FORMAT

- 1. Required Outline. All proposals must follow the required outline presented in Section IV. Proposal Outline. Proposals that fail to follow the required outline will be deemed, at the discretion of the Department, non-responsive and not evaluated.
- 2. Cover Sheet. The Cover Sheet is to be Page 1 of the proposal. Respondents must complete and use the <u>Cover Sheet</u> form, which is embedded in this section as a hyperlink.
- **3. Table of Contents.** All proposals must include a Table of Contents that conforms to the required proposal outline. (See Section IV. PROPOSAL OUTLINE)
- 4. Claim of Exemption from Disclosure. Respondents are advised that all materials associated with this request, procurement or contract are subject to the terms of the Freedom of Information Act, Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 1-200 et seq. (FOIA). Although there are exemptions in the FOIA, they are permissive and not required. If a Respondent believes that certain information or documents or portions of documents required by this request, procurement, or contract is exempt from disclosure under the FOIA, the Respondent must mark such information or documents or portions of documents as EXEMPT. In Section X of its submission, the Respondent must indicate the documents or pages where the information labeled EXEMPT is located in the proposal.

For information or documents so referenced, the Respondent must provide a detailed explanation of the basis for the claim of exemption. Specifically, the Respondent must cite to the FOIA exemption that it is asserting as the basis for claim that the marked material is exempt. In addition, the Respondent must apply the language of the statutory exemption to the information or documents or portions of documents that the Respondent is seeking to protect from disclosure. For example, if a Respondent marks a document as a trade secret, the Respondent must parse the definition in section 1-210(b)(5)(A) and show how all of the factors are met. Notwithstanding this requirement, DSS shall ultimately decide whether such information or documents are exempt from disclosure under the FOIA.

5. Conflict of Interest - Disclosure Statement. Respondents must include a disclosure statement concerning any current business relationships (within the past three (3) years) that pose a conflict of interest, as defined by C.G.S. § 1-85. A conflict of interest exists when a relationship exists between the Respondent and a public official (including an elected official) or State employee that may interfere with fair competition or may be adverse to the interests of the State. The existence of a conflict of interest is not, in and of itself, evidence of wrongdoing. A conflict of interest may, however, become a legal matter if a Respondent tries to influence, or succeeds in influencing, the outcome of an official decision for its personal or corporate benefit. The Department will determine whether any disclosed conflict of interest poses a substantial advantage to the Respondent over the competition, decreases the overall competitiveness of this procurement, or is not in the best interests of the State. In the absence of any conflict of interest, a Respondent must affirm such in the disclosure statement: "[name of

Respondent] has no current business relationship (within the past three (3) years) that poses a conflict of interest, as defined by C.G.S. § 1-85."

- **6. Executive Summary.** Proposals must include a high-level Executive Summary, not exceeding two (2) pages of the main proposal. The Executive Summary shall include:
 - a. Respondent's principal place of business;
 - Respondent's demonstrated experience of a minimum of three (3) years providing nutrition-based program services to low-income individuals and households;
 - Respondent's demonstrated experience of a minimum of two (2) years offering application assistance for social services programs;
 - Respondent's demonstrated ability to serve multicultural, multilingual populations; and;
 - e. Total funding available to the Respondent.

The Department will not evaluate proposals from organizations that do not meet these minimum qualifications.

- **7. Attachments.** Attachments other than the required Appendices or Forms identified in Section IV are not permitted and will not be evaluated. Further, the required Appendices or Forms must not be altered or used to extend, enhance, or replace any requirement of this RFP. Failure to abide by these instructions will result in disqualification.
- **8. Style Requirements.** The original proposal and each of the three (3) conforming copies of the original proposal must conform to the following specifications:

- **9. Pagination.** The Respondent's name must be displayed in the header of each page. All pages, from the Cover Sheet through the required Appendices and Forms, must be numbered consecutively in the footer.
- 10. Packaging and Labeling Requirements. All proposals must be submitted in sealed envelopes or packages and be addressed to the Official Contact. The Legal Name and

Address of the Respondent must appear in the upper left corner of the envelope or package. The RFP Name must be clearly displayed on the envelope or package: **SNAP Outreach _RFP_020516.**

Any received proposal that does not conform to these packaging and labeling instructions will be opened as general mail. Such a proposal may be accepted by the Department as a clerical function, but it will not be evaluated. At the discretion of the Department, such a proposal may be destroyed or retained for pick-up by the submitters.

■ E. EVALUATION OF PROPOSALS

- 1. Evaluation Process. It is the intent of the Department to conduct a comprehensive, fair, and impartial evaluation of proposals received in response to this RFP. When evaluating proposals, negotiating with successful Respondents, and offering the right to negotiate a contract, the Department will conform to its written procedures for POS procurements (pursuant to C.G.S. § 4-217) and the State's Code of Ethics (pursuant to C.G.S. §§ 1-84 and 1-85).
- 2. Evaluation Team. The Department will designate an Evaluation Team to evaluate proposals submitted in response to this RFP. The contents of all submitted proposals, including any confidential information, will be shared with the Evaluation Team. Only proposals found to be responsive (that is, complying with all instructions and requirements described herein) will be reviewed, rated, and scored. Proposals that fail to comply with all instructions will be rejected without further consideration. Attempts by any Respondent (or representative of any Respondent) to contact or influence any member of the Evaluation Team may result in disqualification of the Respondent.
- 3. Minimum Submission Requirements. All proposals must comply with the requirements specified in this RFP. To be eligible for evaluation, proposals must (a) be received on or before the due date and time; (b) meet the Proposal Format requirements; (c) follow the required Proposal Outline; and (d) be complete with all required documentation as outlined. Proposals that fail to follow instructions or satisfy these minimum submission requirements will not be reviewed further. The Department will reject any proposal that deviates significantly from the requirements of this RFP.
- 4. Evaluation Criteria (and Weights). Proposals meeting the Minimum Submission Requirements will be evaluated according to the established criteria. The criteria are the objective standards that the Evaluation Team will use to evaluate the technical merits of the proposals. Only the criteria listed below will be used to evaluate proposals. The criteria are weighted according to their relative importance. The weights are confidential.
 - Organizational Requirements
 - Service Requirements
 - Staffing Requirements see note
 - Data and Technology Requirements
 - Subcontractors and Partners
 - Work Plan
 - Financial Requirements
 - Budget Requirements
 - Appendices

Note:

As part of its evaluation of the Staffing Requirements, the Evaluation Team will consider the Respondent's demonstrated commitment to affirmative action, as required by the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies § 46A-68j-30(10).

- 5. Respondent Selection. Upon completing its evaluation of proposals, the Evaluation Team will submit the rankings of all proposals to the Department head. The final selection of a successful Respondent is at the discretion of the Department head. Any Respondent selected will be so notified and offered an opportunity to negotiate a contract with the Department. Such negotiations may, but will not automatically, result in a contract. Any resulting contract will be posted on the State Contracting Portal. All unsuccessful Respondents will be notified by e-mail or U.S. mail, at the Department's discretion, about the outcome of the evaluation and Respondent selection process.
- 6. Debriefing. After receiving notification from the Department, any Respondent may contact the Official Contact and request a Debriefing of the procurement process and its proposal. If Respondents still have questions after receiving this information, they may contact the Official Contact and request a meeting with the Department to discuss the procurement process. The Department shall schedule and conduct Debriefing meetings that have been properly requested, within fifteen (15) days of the Department's receipt of a request. The Debriefing meeting must not include or allow any comparisons of any proposals with other proposals, nor should the identity of the evaluators be released. The Debriefing process shall not be used to change, alter, or modify the outcome of a competitive procurement. More detailed information about requesting a Debriefing may be obtained from the Official Contact.
- 7. Appeal Process. Any time after the submission due date, but not later than thirty (30) days after the Department notifies Respondents about the outcome of a competitive procurement, Respondents may submit an Appeal to the Department. The e-mail sent date or the postmark date on the notification envelope will be considered "day one" of Respondents may appeal any aspect of the Department's the thirty (30) days. competitive procurement; however, such Appeal must be in writing and must set forth facts or evidence in sufficient and convincing detail for the Department to determine whether during any aspect of the competitive procurement there was a failure to comply with the State's statutes, regulations, or standards concerning competitive procurement or the provisions of the RFP. Any such Appeal must be submitted to the Agency Head with a copy to the Official Contact. The Respondent must include the basis for the Appeal and the remedy requested. The filing of an Appeal shall not be deemed sufficient reason for the Department to delay, suspend, cancel, or terminate the procurement process or execution of a contract. More detailed information about filing an Appeal may be obtained from the Official Contact.
- **8. Contest of Solicitation or Contract Offer.** Pursuant to Section 4e-36 of the Connecticut General Statutes, "Any bidder or proposer on a state contract may contest the solicitation or award of a contract to a subcommittee of the State Contracting Standards Board..." More detailed information is available on the State Contracting Standards Board web site at http://www.ct.gov/scsb/site/default.asp.
- **9. Contract Execution.** Any contract developed and executed as a result of this RFP is subject to the Department's contracting procedures, which may include approval by the Office of the Attorney General.

II. MANDATORY PROVISIONS

A. STANDARD CONTRACT, PARTS I AND II

By submitting a proposal in response to this RFP, the Respondent implicitly agrees to comply with the provisions of Parts I and II of the State's "standard contract" for POS:

Part I of the standard contract is maintained by the Department and will include the scope of services, contract performance, budget, reports, and program-specific provisions of any resulting contract.

Part II of the standard contract is maintained by OPM and includes the mandatory terms and conditions of the contract. The latest revision of Part II Mandatory Terms and Conditions is provided as a hyperlink. Included in Part II of the standard contract is the State Elections Enforcement Commission's notice (pursuant to C.G.S. § 9-612(g) (2)) advising executive branch State contractors and prospective State contractors of the ban on campaign contributions and solicitations.

Part I of the standard contract may be amended by means of a written instrument signed by the Department, the selected Respondent (contractor), and, if required, the Attorney General's Office. Part II of the standard contract may be amended only in consultation with, and with the approval of, the Office of Policy and Management and the Attorney General's Office.

■ B. ASSURANCES

By submitting a proposal in response to this RFP, a Respondent implicitly gives the following assurances:

- 1. Collusion. The Respondent represents and warrants that the Respondent did not participate in any part of the RFP development process and had no knowledge of the specific contents of the RFP prior to its issuance. The Respondent further represents and warrants that no agent, representative, or employee of the State participated directly in the preparation of the Respondent's proposal. The Respondent also represents and warrants that the submitted proposal is in all respects fair and is made without collusion or fraud.
- 2. State Officials and Employees. The Respondent certifies that no elected or appointed official or employee of the State has or will benefit financially or materially from any contract resulting from this RFP. The Department may terminate a resulting contract if it is determined that gratuities of any kind were either offered or received by any of the aforementioned officials or employees from the Respondent, contractor, or its agents or employees.
- 3. Competitors. The Respondent assures that the submitted proposal is not made in connection with any competing organization or competitor submitting a separate proposal in response to this RFP. No attempt has been made, or will be made, by the Respondent to induce any other organization or competitor to submit, or not submit, a proposal for the purpose of restricting competition. The Respondent further assures that the proposed costs have been arrived at independently, without consultation, communication, or agreement with any other organization or competitor for the purpose of restricting competition. Nor has the Respondent knowingly disclosed the proposed

costs on a prior basis, either directly or indirectly, to any other organization or competitor.

- 4. Validity of Proposal. The Respondent certifies that the proposal represents a valid and binding offer to provide services in accordance with the terms and provisions described in this RFP and any amendments or addenda hereto. The proposal shall remain valid for a period of 180 days after the submission due date and may be extended beyond that time by mutual agreement. At its sole discretion, the Department may include the proposal, by reference or otherwise, into any contract with the successful Respondent.
- **5. Press Releases.** The Respondent agrees to obtain prior written consent and approval of the Department for press releases that relate in any manner to this RFP or any resultant contract.

■ C. TERMS AND CONDITIONS

By submitting a proposal in response to this RFP, a Respondent implicitly agrees to comply with the following terms and conditions:

- 1. Equal Opportunity and Affirmative Action. The State is an Equal Opportunity and Affirmative Action employer and does not discriminate in its hiring, employment, or business practices. The State is committed to complying with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) and does not discriminate on the basis of disability in admission to, access to, or operation of its programs, services, or activities.
- **2. Preparation Expenses.** Neither the State nor the Department shall assume any liability for expenses incurred by a Respondent in preparing, submitting, or clarifying any proposal submitted in response to this RFP.
- **3. Exclusion of Taxes.** The Department is exempt from the payment of excise and sales taxes imposed by the federal government and the State. Respondents are liable for any other applicable taxes.
- **4. Proposed Costs.** No cost submissions that are contingent upon a State action will be accepted. All proposed costs must be fixed through the entire term of the contract.
- 5. Changes to Proposal. No additions or changes to the original proposal will be allowed after submission. While changes are not permitted, the Department may request and authorize Respondents to submit written clarification of their proposals, in a manner or format prescribed by the Department, and at the Respondent's expense.
- 6. Supplemental Information. Supplemental information will not be considered after the deadline for submission of proposals, unless specifically requested by the Department. The Department may ask a Respondent to give demonstrations, interviews, oral presentations or further explanations to clarify information contained in a proposal. Any such demonstration, interview, or oral presentation will be at a time selected and in a place provided by the Department. At its sole discretion, the Department may limit the number of Respondents invited to make such a demonstration, interview, or oral presentation and may limit the number of attendees per Respondent.
- 7. Presentation of Supporting Evidence. If requested by the Department, a Respondent must be prepared to present evidence of experience, ability, and data reporting capabilities, financial standing, or other information necessary to satisfactorily meet the requirements set forth or implied in this RFP. The Department may make onsite visits to an operational facility or facilities of a Respondent to evaluate further the Respondent's

- capability to perform the duties required by this RFP. At its discretion, the Department may also check or contact any reference provided by the Respondent.
- 8. RFP Is Not An Offer. Neither this RFP nor any subsequent discussions shall give rise to any commitment on the part of the State or the Department or confer any rights on any Respondent unless and until a contract is fully executed by the necessary parties. The contract document will represent the entire agreement between the Respondent and the Department and will supersede all prior negotiations, representations or agreements, alleged or made, between the parties. The State shall assume no liability for costs incurred by the Respondent or for payment of services under the terms of the contract until the successful Respondent is notified that the contract has been accepted and approved by the Department and, if required, by the Attorney General's Office.

■ D. RIGHTS RESERVED TO THE STATE

By submitting a proposal in response to this RFP, a Respondent implicitly accepts that the following rights are reserved to the State:

- **1. Timing Sequence.** The timing and sequence of events associated with this RFP shall ultimately be determined by the Department.
- 2. Amending or Canceling RFP. The Department reserves the right to amend or cancel this RFP on any date and at any time, if the Department deems it to be necessary, appropriate, or otherwise in the best interests of the State.
- **3. No Acceptable Proposals.** In the event that no acceptable proposals are submitted in response to this RFP, the Department may reopen the procurement process, if it is determined to be in the best interests of the State.
- 4. Offer and Rejection of Proposals. The Department reserves the right to offer in part, and/or to reject any and all proposals in whole or in part, for misrepresentation or if the proposal limits or modifies any of the terms, conditions, or specifications of this RFP. The Department may waive minor technical defects, irregularities, or omissions, if in its judgment the best interests of the State will be served. The Department reserves the right to reject the proposal of any Respondent who submits a proposal after the submission date and time.
- 5. Sole Property of the State. All proposals submitted in response to this RFP are to be the sole property of the State. Any product, whether acceptable or unacceptable, developed under a contract executed as a result of this RFP shall be the sole property of the State, unless stated otherwise in this RFP or subsequent contract. The right to publish, distribute, or disseminate any and all information or reports, or part thereof, shall accrue to the State without recourse.
- **6. Contract Negotiation.** The Department reserves the right to negotiate or contract for all or any portion of the services contained in this RFP. The Department further reserves the right to contract with one or more Respondent for such services. After reviewing the scored criteria, the Department may seek Best and Final Offers (BFO) on cost from Respondents. The Department may set parameters on any BFOs received.
- 7. Clerical Errors in Contract Offer. The Department reserves the right to correct inaccurate contract offers resulting from its clerical errors. This may include, in extreme circumstances, revoking the offer of a contract already made to a Respondent and subsequently offering the contract to another Respondent. Such action on the part of the State shall not constitute a breach of contract on the part of the State since the

contract with the initial Respondent is deemed to be void *ab initio* and of no effect as if no contract ever existed between the State and the Respondent.

8. Key Personnel. When the Department is the sole funder of a purchased service, the Department reserves the right to approve any additions, deletions, or changes in key personnel, with the exception of program staff that have terminated employment. The Department also reserves the right to approve replacements for key personnel that have terminated employment. The Department further reserves the right to require the removal and replacement of any of the Respondent's key personnel who do not perform adequately, regardless of whether they were previously approved by the Department.

■ E. STATUTORY AND REGULATORY COMPLIANCE

By submitting a proposal in response to this RFP, the Respondent implicitly agrees to comply with all applicable State and federal laws and regulations, including, but not limited to, the following:

- 1. Freedom of Information, C.G.S. § 1-210(b). The Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) generally requires the disclosure of documents in the possession of the State upon request of any citizen, unless the content of the document falls within certain categories of exemption, as defined by C.G.S. § 1-210(b). Respondents are generally advised not to include in their proposals any confidential information. If the Respondent indicates pursuant to Section I.C.12 above, that certain documentation, as required by this RFP, is submitted in confidence, the State will endeavor to keep said information confidential to the extent permitted by law. The State has no obligation to initiate, prosecute, or defend any legal proceeding or to seek a protective order or other similar relief to prevent disclosure of any information pursuant to a FOIA request. The Respondent has the burden of establishing the availability of any FOIA exemption in any proceeding where it is an issue. While a Respondent may claim an exemption to the State's FOIA, the final administrative authority to release or exempt any or all material so identified rests with the State. In no event shall the State or any of its employees have any liability for disclosure of documents or information in the possession of the State and which the State or its employees believe(s) to be required pursuant to the FOIA or other requirements of law.
- 2. Contract Compliance, C.G.S. § 4a-60 and Regulations of CT State Agencies § 46a-68j-21 thru 43, inclusive. Connecticut statute and regulations impose certain obligations on State agencies (as well as contractors and subcontractors doing business with the State) to ensure that State agencies do not enter into contracts with organizations or businesses that discriminate against protected class persons. Detailed information is available on CHRO's web site at Contract Compliance. IMPORTANT NOTE: The Respondent must upload the Workplace Analysis Affirmative Action Report into the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) on-line data vault, called BizNet, prior to submitting an application in response to this RFP. More information about uploading standard contract documents is embedded in this section as a hyperlink.
- 3. Consulting Agreements, C.G.S. § 4a-81. Proposals for State contracts with a value of \$50,000 or more in a calendar or fiscal year, excluding leases and licensing agreements of any value, shall include a consulting agreement affidavit attesting to whether any consulting agreement has been entered into in connection with the application. As used herein "consulting agreement" means any written or oral agreement to retain the services, for a fee, of a consultant for the purposes of (A) providing counsel to a contractor, vendor, consultant or other entity seeking to conduct, or conducting, business with the State, (B) contacting, whether in writing or orally, any executive, judicial, or administrative office of the State, including any department, institution, bureau, board,

commission, authority, official or employee for the purpose of solicitation, dispute resolution, introduction, requests for information or (C) any other similar activity related to such contract. Consulting agreement does not include any agreements entered into with a consultant who is registered under the provisions of C.G.S. Chapter 10 as of the date such affidavit is submitted in accordance with the provisions of C.G.S. § 4a-81. The Consulting Agreement Affidavit (OPM Ethics Form 5) is available on OPM's website at OPM: Ethics Forms IMPORTANT NOTE: The Respondent must upload the Consulting Agreement Affidavit (OPM Ethics Form 5) into the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) on-line data vault, called BizNet, prior to submitting an application in response to this RFP. More information about uploading standard contract documents is embedded in this section as a hyperlink.

- 4. Limitation on Use of Appropriated Funds to Influence Certain Federal Contracting and Financial Transactions, 31 USC § 1352. A responsive submission shall include a Certification Regarding Lobbying form, which is embedded in this section as a hyperlink, attesting to the fact that none of the funds appropriated by any Act may be expended by the recipient of a federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement to pay any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the: (A) awarding of any federal contract; (B) making of any federal grant; (C) making of any federal loan; (D) entering into of any cooperative agreement; or (E) extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
- 5. Gift and Campaign Contributions, C.G.S. §§ 4-250 and 4-252(c); Governor M. Jodi Rell's Executive Orders No. 1, Para. 8 and No. 7C, Para. 10; C.G.S. § 9-612(g)(2). If a Respondent is awarded an opportunity to negotiate a contract with an anticipated value of \$50,000 or more in a calendar or fiscal year, the Respondent must fully disclose any gifts or lawful contributions made to campaigns of candidates for statewide public office or the General Assembly. Municipalities and Connecticut State agencies are exempt from this requirement. ■ A. DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Department of Social Services (DSS) administers and delivers a wide variety of services to children, families, adults, people with disabilities and elders, including health care coverage, child support, long-term care and supports, energy assistance, food and nutrition aid, and program grants. DSS administers myriad state and federal programs and approximately one-third of the state budget, currently serving more than 950,000 individuals in 600,000 households (October 2014 data).

By statute, DSS is the state agency responsible for administering a number of programs under federal legislation, including the Food Stamp Act, the Older Americans Act, and the Social Security Act.

The department is headed by the Commissioner of Social Services, Roderick L. Bremby. The agency delivers most of its programs through 12 field offices (including three benefits centers available by phone) located throughout the state, with central administrative offices located in Hartford. In addition, many services funded by the agency are available through community-based agencies and partner contractors.

■ B. PROGRAM OVERVIEW Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) Outreach

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), formerly known as the Food Stamp program, is a nutrition program funded and administered by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food and Nutrition Service (FNS). The program helps low-income individuals and families to buy food and provides nutrition education to help recipients choose foods that enhance their health and well-being. The current program was set up in 1971, and underwent a name change from Food Stamps to SNAP in October 2008. The Connecticut Department of Social Services operates the program at the state level following rules from the USDA.

As of October 2015, the Department provided federal SNAP benefits to 234,727 households. Those households were comprised of 418,002 individuals. The average monthly benefit for Federal Fiscal Year 2015 was \$135.00 The Department also serves approximately 400 people under the State-Funded SNAP.

There are individuals and households who are potentially eligible for SNAP, but for a variety of reasons are not receiving these benefits. The Department is looking at a variety of measures to increase the number of qualified individuals and households receiving benefits.

The Department is seeking responsive proposals from eligible organizations with the capacity to provide SNAP outreach services and application assistance. This program requires interaction with individuals and households who are potentially eligible for SNAP benefits. The contractor must be able to go on site to community locations where potential SNAP applicants may congregate regularly for other services and activities such as food pantries, church feeding programs, schools, etc., and offer other outreach initiatives to increase participation in SNAP. Contractor outreach staff must be willing to undergo all required training from the Department to be able to explain the benefits of SNAP and help those seeking the benefits to apply. A copy of the USDA FNS <u>State Outreach Plan Guidance</u> is embedded in this section as a hyperlink.

Major Program Goals

- 1. Create or maintain alliances with community-based organizations (CBOs) that serve low-income individuals throughout Connecticut.
- 2. Create or maintain partnerships with the Department's SNAP Employment and Training (E&T) contractors and SNAP Nutrition Education providers to further the reach and impact of SNAP-Outreach activities.
- 3. Provide outreach specialists to visit CBOs on a regular basis to provide information about SNAP and assistance with the application process.
- 4. Assistance with the SNAP application process will focus on use of the Department's ConneCT online application option as the primary tool for the work outcomes to be performed.
- 5. Increase the number of eligible individuals and families receiving SNAP benefits.

This RFP seeks to execute one (1) contract for the provision of SNAP outreach services and application assistance, directly and through subcontracting, to potentially eligible individuals and families residing in Connecticut who are not receiving SNAP benefits. The Department expects such services to be performed on an ongoing basis during the contract period and any extensions or renewals thereof.

The contractor shall be responsible for increasing the visibility of SNAP and its benefits to potentially eligible individuals and families through community outreach services and increasing the number of applications statewide. The contractor shall contact a minimum number of potential SNAP recipients through direct individual and group outreach, conduct a minimum number of pre-screenings, and assist a minimum number of potential recipients with the application process.

The contractor shall be required to function as a fiscal intermediary to any organization that obtains funding from other sources to provide SNAP outreach services or application assistance to the target population, including State, federal, and private funding sources.

The Department has the authority to make the final determination on a client's eligibility for SNAP benefits. In the event of any dispute regarding the eligibility of clients, the Department's determination is final and binding on all parties.

Individuals or households that wish to apply for SNAP benefits may do so. The contractor shall not deny the right to apply for SNAP benefits to any individual or household.

 - vi. Obtaining and distributing generic marketing material from the U.S. Food and Nutrition Service, and producing marketing material tailored to Connecticut's target population; and
 - vii. Preparing and implementing a response plan to provide SNAP outreach services and application assistance to individuals impacted by a disaster.
