National Resource Center: Able Accounts- ABLE accounts are a tax-advantaged savings account for individuals with disabilities and their families. Eligible individuals and their families will be allowed to establish ABLE savings accounts that will not affect their eligibility for SSI, Medicaid, and other public benefits. The savings can be used for disability-related expenses on behalf of the beneficiary. Also, there is information on Special Needs Trusts which allows the accumulation of money for the use of disability related expenses without jeopardizing state and/or federal benefits.
