



# National Survey for Individuals aged 12 and above.

- 134.7 million people reported consuming alcohol (47.5%)
- 61.4 million people reported binge drinking (21.7%)
- 16.4 million people reported heavy alcohol use (5.8%)

Figure 8. Past Month Alcohol Use, Past Month Binge Alcohol Use, or Past Month Heavy Alcohol Use: Among People Aged 12 or Older; 2023



Note: Binge Alcohol Use is defined as drinking five or more drinks (for males) or four or more drinks (for females) on the same occasion on at least 1 day in the past 30 days. Heavy Alcohol Use is defined as binge drinking on the same occasion on 5 or more days in the past 30 days; all heavy alcohol users are also binge alcohol users.

# Out of the CT High School Students surveyed...

- 13.8% have been in a vehicle with a driver under the influence of alcohol.
- 5.5% have driven a vehicle under the influence of alcohol.
- 10.7% had their first drink of alcohol before age 13.
- 21.1% report currently drinking alcohol.
- 11.6% report binge drinking.



# Alcohol Compliance Checks

- FFY24: **246** off-premise inspected
  - **68.70%** compliant (169)
- FFY25: **217** off-premise inspected
  - **82.03%** complaint (178)

### Retailer Education

- Required training for retailers to obtain Liquor Permits from DCP
- DCP, DMHAS and DOT collaboration




Percentages of Clients by Race in State Fiscal Year 2024

### DMHAS Client Demographics – State Fiscal Year 2024



- Of the 14,655 clients with an AUD diagnosis in State Fiscal Year 2024, the greatest percentage (34%) were in the 35-44 age range
- 80% of the clients with an AUD diagnosis were between the ages of 26 and 64



# Levels of Care / Types of Services State Operated and Private Non-Profit Providers

- Withdrawal Management (200 beds)
- Residential Treatment (ASAM 3.7-3.1) (~800 beds)
- Recovery Houses (200 beds)
  - New Medically Enhanced Recovery House opening January 2026
- Sober Houses
- Outpatient / IOP
- FDA-approved medications for AUD
  - Acamprosate, disulfiram, naltrexone
