Welcome Review of Minutes	The meeting began at 1:34p.m. Approval of meeting minutes from last meeting. Tom R. motioned to approve the minutes and Ramona seconded.	Minutes Approved
Fatherhood Initiative Department of Social Services, Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services	 Connecticut Fatherhood Initiative (CFI) Teach. Love. Inspire. CT Leaders came together for the Connecticut Fatherhood Initiative (CFI) to discuss fatherhood engagement and to ensure approach was based on system change. It was seen that a father's absence had a direct impact on children which led to the passing of Public Act 99-193 and its codification in CT General Statute. CT was the first state in the nation to pass Fatherhood Legislation. Public Act 99-193 led to the creation of the Fatherhood Initiative and Council to promote positive involvement and interaction for fathers with their children and to strengthen child support enforcement. Efforts made by CFI are not at the expense of mothers. Children are at the heart of the work and they support both parents whether they live with the children or not. A goal for the CFI program is to help children be successful and for both children and parents to have better outcomes. Public Act 22-138 passed last year. The bill created the Office of the CT Fatherhood Initiative within DSS, establishes council oversight with additional members and allows for CFI to seek additional funding and collaborative opportunities to improve services for fathers.

Public Act 22-138 Promotes education concerning emotional and financial responsibilities of fatherhood, assists men in preparation for legal, financial and emotional responsibilities of fatherhood, promotes the establishment of paternity at childbirth, encourages fathers regardless of marital status to foster emotional connection to financially support their children, integrate state and local services available for families, establish support mechanisms for fathers in their relationship with their children, regardless of their marital or financial status.

The council is led by the Commissioner of DSS and co-led by Senator, Marilyn Moore. The council consists of over 25 Connecticut agencies, and all three branches of CT government.

DSS has the following Certified Fatherhood Programs: Fathers for Life, Bridgeport, CT, Responsible Fatherhood Program, Catholic Charities, Hartford, CT, Nurturing Fathers Program, Family Stride Inc, Torrington CT, Teen Father Program OBAPP Inc, Bridgeport, Fatherhood Initiative Program, Madonna Place, Norwich, CT, New Opportunities Inc, Waterbury, CT and Male Involvement Network, Urban Community Alliance, New Haven, CT.

Each of these program's services include economic stability services, which are things around financial literacy, understanding your credit, building wealth, home ownership. They also offer intensive case management as well as curriculumbased instruction. Many of the folks here represented used 24/7 dads and one offers a teen dads program. The intensive case management can include anything from the establishment of paternity to working with individuals who have child support orders. The program will help with access and visitation and custody orders as well as DSS assistance programs, housing, employment, education, training, parenting and self-help.

Over the past three years, they have seen a 36% decrease in men being served at the Fatherhood Programs.

Per Title 9, Fatherhood Initiative is available to women. They are part of the Fatherhood Initiative and access the services. Under the federal guidelines the curriculum did not have to be changed to adapt it for women. So they are learning alongside the men. It's been really beneficial to the programs, because sometimes these women have different perspectives than the men in our program.

There is an Interagency Fatherhood MOU that is with DSS, DCF, DOC, SDE, DOL, DPH, DHMAS, Judicial SES, Judicial CSSD< DOH, DVA, BOPP and CSCU to provide active participation while seeking opportunities for collaboration.

Infusing Prevention Into Fatherhood Services-DHMAS-DSS Hartford, Torrington, Waterbury, Bridgeport and New London.	 DMHAS partnered with CFI to provide incorporate the strategic prevention framework into the program for seven fatherhood programs in Hartford, Torrington, Waterbury, Bridgeport and New London. The agencies learned about and utilized the strategic prevention framework. They incorporated prevention basics and other information about alcohol, tobacco and other drugs through the DMHAS Prevention and Health Promotion's Technical Assistance and Training Center contractor. Additionally, program staff attended a CADCA conference, which is the leading substance use prevention organization. Members will also attend the New England Fathering Conference in March as well as the CT Fathering Conference in June. DMHAS Prevention Funding – the objective was to incorporate prevention messaging into the curriculum fathers go through both individually and in group settings so that prevention education is molded into the learnings to increase protective factors by incorporating these messages into being a role model with younger children, impact of substance use and a child's perception of risk, etc. Messages were offered to help stimulate understanding as well as conversations with children. For next steps, funding will continue until September 2024 with the Governor's Prevention Partnership to support the implementation and mentorship of the SPF within the CFIs. 	Contact Sarju Shah:
