Child Health and Development Institute	CHDI presented on improving early substance us care for youth.	
(CHDI) of CT: SUD and SBIRT Presentation	Youth substance use is common and widely untreated. 2.8% of	
	youth needing treatment actually received services. In addition,	
	disparities exist in LGB youth, and while substance use rates are	
	similar across races, there are disparities in treatment access and	
	outcomes. Barriers to care include stigma, bifurcated systems,	
	legalization of marijuana, and reimbursement rates and inclusion of	
	other essential direct service staff.	
	Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT)	
	training will be offered at outpatient clinics. This will offer	
	opportunities to treat substance use with mild/moderate youth	
	within the clinics. Youth with positive mental health treatment have	
	a 60% higher rate of engagement in substance use treatment.	
	Recommendations include expand availability of SBIRT	
	reimbursement codes to outpatient staff, increase rates to match	
	SAMHSA's recommendations, expand training to implement and	
	sustain A-SBIRT, screen universally, formalize localized	
	collaborations, and invest in a continuum of care for youth.

Substance Screening, Treatment, and	SSTRY offers SBIRT for screening, as well treatment and recovery	
Recovery for Youth (SSTRY) Presentation:	services for youth through the age of 24 inclusive statewide.	
	Agencies include CHR, Children's Center of Hamden, and Child and	
	Family Guidance of Bridgeport.	
	SBIRTs are conducted in the community (approximately 30 minute	
	appointments) for youth with substance use concerns and help to	
	motivate and engage those who are recommended for treatment.	
	Toxicology is collected. When treatment is recommended, SSTRY	
	will directly connect them to treatment. A report is generated for	
	the youth and the referral source. Referrals are open to anyone.	
	SSTRY uses Community Reinforcement Approach-Assertive	
	Continuing Care as the treatment and recovery approach. The CRA	
	portion is approximately 4 months followed by 4 more months of	
	ACC. CRA sessions include the youth alone, caregiver or significant	
	other alone, or all together. In addition to substance use treatment,	
	SSTRY offers connections to MAT (as needed), case management,	
	and life skills. ACC continues with recovery supports and case	
	management to increase recovery capital.	
	Youth are not turned away because of inability to pay. For
