(b) DMHAS – State Opioid Response (SOR)	 SOR funded in 2020 to DMHAS from SAMHSA for two years to reduce opioid overdose related deaths. (09/29/22 end date). Applied for another round of SOR funding and expecting to hear back at the end of the month. NOTE: This portion of SOR funded activities is related to prevention. Focus was on Education and Awareness Training for Workforce Mobile Resource Van - 11 events reaching 6,855 people, included billboards and PSA's. Coalition Mini Grants to support OUD Awareness, Safe Storage and Disposal of prescription drugs at the local level Partnered with United Way of CT (211) for lock box distribution. Overdose Prevention and Harm Reduction – RBHAOs supported the training of over 200 individuals on Narcan administration and 346 kits distributed. (c) DCF – Project ASSERT	 Alison Wiser presented and gave the Assert Grant update. Funding is from SAMSHA/CSAT and no cost extension ended on September 30th. DCF partnered with DMHAS and CSSD, Beacon Health and UConn Health treatment providers for training entities and to support. Increase access to evidence-based model for Opioid use among 16-21year old introduced, Hype Recovery. Originally 4 teams and then added 2 more so that it is available in all 6 Regions. Collected intake GPRA data from participants. Prepare the emerging an existing workforce to provide the highest quality of care, workforce training and skill building related to SUD treatment. Another goal is social marketing to reduce stigma and to encourage screening and building awareness of available supports and treatment. Assisted Intervention Matching Tool (AIM) version 1 launched on 8/5/22 for use by DCF. Next version will be launched in September 2022 for use by community providers and families doing the work. State Review on Naloxone Update	 After the last meeting, a subset of the Prevention subcommittee met to discuss how to increase awareness of naloxone. During the meeting the following discussions occurred: A group keeps Naloxone in a box similar to what a heart defibrillator would be kept in. Can people under age 18 be trained on how to administer Naloxone? Having Naloxone in Public areas as an (AED). In response to training those under age – Giovanna Mozzo shared that individual's under age 18 have participated in-person training, but were not prescribed Narcan kits. Deborah Lake recommended to review the document from 2015 Guidelines for Opioid Overdose Education and Naloxone Distribution (DPH) that provided guidance. Scott reported that Sober houses have Naloxone in them. They have a lock box and people know where they are, when to open them. An alarm goes off and everyone who needs to be alerted is alerted. Just in Time Training (JIST) - Scott shared we should find out where the problems are, what are hospitals doing with CCARTS and other donations and possibly include hospital preparedness into the discussion. Additionally, we are missing input from EMS system and First Responders. Judith Stronger and Allison Fulton recommended that additional discussion is needed on awareness and availability of naloxone, review of other states best 	Motion: Allison Fulton moved to convene a Naloxone Workgroup. Robert Kanehl seconded the motion. Committee approved. Next Steps: Recommendation to convene a Naloxone Workgroup through the Prevention Subcommittee to (1) increase public awareness; (2) establish standard minimum training requirements; (3) eliminate barriers, and (4) improve access to naloxone statewide. Allison Fulton asked for approval to bring this to the October ADPC meeting. Scott Szalkiewicz, Ramona Anderson, Kelley Edwards volunteered to sit on workgroup.

The cannabis workgroup utilized a worksheet developed by the Prevention Technology Transfer Center Network to identify where current and proposed regulations and policies are strong and where more specific prevention informed approaches may be needed.
