## Questions/Comments:

Andrew Lyon mentioned that North Canaan recently received a Drug Free Community funding and asked how that implementation be considered in the community selection. Stephanie Welch mentioned that th this falls under the RFP process.

Giovanna Mozzo asked the timeline of the RFP. Stephanie Welch mentioned that it will be listed on the DAS RFP website and to keep checking that website.

Allison Fulton asked how the communities were selected. Stephanie Welch explained as part of the application process, CPES pulled prevention data, and looked at state and federal funding related to prevention which was conducted in the spring.

Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) within the CT DOC, presentation by Deborah Daniel, RN, BSN, Department of Public Health Deborah Daniel, Opioid Services Coordinator for CT Department of Public Health supporting the Department of Correction. She works in consort with Deputy Warden Sandra Violette. MOUD expansion project is done with support from DPH, DMHAS and DOC and includes vendor partners – APT|Foundation; Recovery Network of Programs and CHR.

Presentation began with a brief history of addiction treatment at CT DOC:

- Addiction Services Unit began through a special act in the 1970s
- 1988 is when DOC first began the opioid treatment program (OTP) at York Correctional Institution
- 2002 Required licensing for all substance abuse counselors
- 2013 first vendor based program at New Haven Correctional center
- 2014 second program opened
- 2018 additional programs opened

## **Expansion Barriers**

- At the York Correctional Institution staff were required to dissolve methadone tablets for 100+ individuals daily (Manual/ labor intensive process)
- They were able to expand to vendor run programs and were meeting capacity for those individuals that were on maintenance only. Difficulties related to transporting large number of methadone doses
- Since not all facilities have an OTP program; there was a challenge with populations transferring to other facilities and also with security levels

Currently program within 10 facilities</li> <li>Looking to enhance medication delivery system (dispensing equipment and software)</li> <li>Offers all 3 of FDA approved medications for MAT</li> <li>Governor assigned \$8M over 2 years plus \$6M to support OTP. Funding was not for hiring staff therefore looked into vendors to support program; increase medications and infrastructure. Additional funding from SOR for a Naloxone Coordinator</li> <li>Ingrid Gillespie asked what type of trends is she seeing or hearing of. Deborah Daniel mentioned that facilities have different cultures and each has their own set of challenges. An example provided, was issues for privacy of inmates who need to get their medications. Another challenge is to receive buy-in and full support from staff.</li> </ul>

It was discussed to include Giovanna Mozzo and Kitty Hickcox for future presentations.  Ingrid Gillespie asked for more information on rainbow fentanyl. Bobby Lawlor responded that DEA defines it as multicolored pills packaged together. In CT we have seen purple and dark blue pills. Surita Rao asked a follow-up question on the purpose of the rainbow pills and Bobby Lawlor responded that it was a business technique.  Bobby Lawlor also mentioned that he will be presenting with Traci Green at tomorrow's ADPC meeting on community level drug checking.
