DMHAS Reports Second Patient Death Related to COVID-19

Hartford, CT – The Connecticut Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (DMHAS) is saddened to report today that a second patient who had been in one of DMHAS’ inpatient psychiatric facilities has died due to complications related to the coronavirus. The individual had been a patient at Connecticut Valley Hospital but had been transferred to an acute care hospital where the individual died yesterday after a brief hospitalization. Commissioner Miriam Delphin-Rittmon said, “This is another tragic reminder of just how deadly this virus can be. Each life that is lost has a story to tell. My thoughts are with all of the behavioral health community who have experienced a loss because of this pandemic.”

DMHAS operates over 760 mental health and substance use beds and employs approximately 3,300 staff throughout the state-operated service system. No other information can be released at this time due to patient privacy laws.

Data included in the table below shows the cumulative number of patients and staff in DMHAS facilities that have had laboratory confirmed cases of COVID-19 since the outbreak began. Data below the table shows the number of patients and staff that have recovered from the virus.

*Previous data reported for CMHC did not include 5 staff working in outpatient settings. Those 5 staff have recovered.

As outlined in the non-test based criteria disseminated by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention [Guidance regarding Discontinuation of Transmission-Based Precautions and Disposition of Patients with COVID-19 in Healthcare Settings](#), patients at DMHAS are recovering from COVID-19.

To date, a total of 36 patients have recovered; 26 patients at Connecticut Valley Hospital and 10 patients at Whiting Forensic Hospital. Additionally, 50 staff members have provided medical documentation showing they have recovered from COVID-19, allowing them to return safely to work.

DMHAS continues to take significant steps to protect clients and staff from COVID-19 throughout the DMHAS inpatient units. These include:

- Utilizing spaces in all state-operated facilities to be used for the isolation of patients with COVID-19;
- Distributing personal protective equipment (PPE) including n95 masks, surgical masks, gowns, gloves and hand sanitizer to all state-operated facilities;
- Using quarantine and isolation protocols for patients and staff that have been reviewed and approved by the Department of Public Health;
- Restricting visitors from DMHAS facilities;
- Conducting health screenings of all individuals who enter DMHAS facilities, including staff and clients;
- Directing staff who are symptomatic or have been in close contact with individuals suspected of or having COVID-19 to stay home and self-quarantine to prevent infecting clients and other staff;
- Briefly suspending admissions in DMHAS inpatient services where community providers have capacity to absorb patients;
- Temporarily reducing bed capacities in certain units across the system in order to maintain proper social distancing requirements;
- Re-allocating critical staff in order to expand capacity to isolate COVID patients
- Continuing planning to accommodate COVID-19 surge;
- Continuing use of acute care general hospital settings to provide care for patients with serious medical conditions;
- Testing of all patients at Connecticut Valley Hospital for COVID-19;
- Beginning testing of all DMHAS employees with initial testing focus at CVH and,
- Obtaining additional consultation from the Department of Public Health regarding strategies for management of cohorts of patients.
