#### **Changing Lives..... Shaping Futures**

Advocacy Unlimited, Inc. is a consumer run, DMHASfunded, non-profit organization. AU facilitates the empowerment and recovery of people with psychiatric disabilities. AU offers participants who live in the community and in institutions a comprehensive, 14-week course that provides extensive training in self, systems, and legislative advocacy skills. Graduates perform internships within the community for six months and become part of a grassroots network of trained advocates that help others in their recovery by advocating for their rights and teaching them to advocate for themselves. Knowledge and skills ensure that people play a central role in shaping the services and policies that affect their lives. AU advocates are a constant presence in statewide policy meetings at the Capitol during legislative session, working to educate legislators to defend and expand the rights of people with psychiatric disabilities. Advocacy Unlimited also provides a wealth of information, support, and resources pertaining to mental health and the issues surrounding it, including awareness and stigma to members of the public, providers and consumers.




#### Number of AU Graduates by Year

• 35 advocates were recognized by AU for their work educating legislators at the capitol.

This year:

- 123 advocate appearances at AU bimonthly meetings (24.6 per meeting).
- **Fifty** advocates are currently completing placements.
