Over \$100 Million in Federal Grant Awards

CT Medication Assisted Treatment Expansion Grant (MATx)

- \$3 million over three years
- September 2016 2019

CT State Targeted Response to the Opioid Crisis Grant (STR)

- \$5.5 million each year over two years. Total \$11 million
- May 2017 April 2019

CT State Opioid Response (SOR) Grant

- \$11 million each year over the first two years: Oct 2018 Sept 2020
- Additional \$5.8 million supplemental grant
- \$ 14 million per year: Oct 2020 Sept 2024

COSSAP Grant

• \$6 million over three years: Oct 2021 – Sept 2024

PROUD (Parents Recovering From Opioid Use Disorders)

• \$2.7 million over three years: 2020-2023

Connecticut Drug Overdose Data

- OCME data overview
- DPH data report
 - 1531 confirmed overdose deaths in 2021
 - 1467 confirmed overdose deaths in 2022
 - 85% of fentanyl analog involved in these deaths
 - 24% deaths involved xylazine
 - Around 60% of decedents died at a residence





Treatment

- Residential through outpatient levels of care
- Residential for Pregnant and Parenting Women (PPW)
- Medication has been proven to be the best treatment for opioid use disorders (methadone, buprenorphine, naltrexone). That does not mean that some people cannot free themselves of opioids by other means such as NA or other peer support networks or faith interventions
- Clinic Based Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)
- Enhanced: MAT +recovery coaching+ employment services

- Statewide toll-free number for people seeking treatment and information about treatment and services
- Answered 24/7/365
- Screenings via conference call with the caller, Access Line operator and provider
- Transportation to withdrawal management/detox and some residential treatment is available when necessary



Opioid Treatment Programs (OTP)

- DMHAS Oversight: State Opioid Treatment Authority (SOTA)
- Methadone Maintenance programs
- Withdrawal Management programs if utilize methadone protocol
- 22.397 individuals served in 2021 vs 21,903 individuals served in 2020
- 50 OTPs in CT
 - 11 withdrawal management programs
 - 32 methadone maintenance clinics
 - 1 located in VA (West Haven)
 - 7 OTPs located within DOC facilities (6 PNP, 1 DOC)
- OTP Regulatory Standards



Women's Recovery Support Programs and Outpatient Services

• 15 beds statewide

- Designed for pregnant/ parenting women and their children – may reside in the program together
- Coordination with community treatment and recovery supports
- Daily on-site groups focused on supporting recovery
- 24/7 staffing
- Community based outpatient and intensive outpatient services
 - Gender specific and trauma informed
 - On site childcare to reduce barriers to treatment

Substance Exposed Pregnancy Initiative of CT (SEPI-CT)

SEPI-CT (formally SEI-FASD Statewide Initiative) aims to strengthen capacity at the community, provider, and systems levels to improve the health and well-being of infants born substance exposed through supporting the recovery of pregnant people and their families.

This initiative is funded by CT DMHAS and CT DCF and contracted through Wheeler.

Potential to incorporate messaging about fentanyl lethality, secure storage and environment, into ongoing health campaigns, create a landing spot on soon to be launched SEPI website and/or create a companion video to soon to be launched Family Care Plan video.

- "Treatment Program Pathway" (TPP) Recovery Coaches at Bridgeport, New London, Waterbury and Torrington Courts
- Early Screening Intervention (ESI) Resource Counselors at five additional courts




