The Food Export Marketing Forum on September 27- 28, 2011, offers a chance to connect with international firms and resources while providing the latest information and ongoing trends in food exporting. Along with showcasing their products to international buyers, participants can meet with market representatives and trade experts to talk about the international potential of their product(s) and exporting techniques to make that happen. 

NOFA SUMMER CONFERENCE AUG 12-14

Scholarship also requires a two-hour volunteer shift at the conference and a post-conference evaluation survey.

Any member of NOFA, MOFGA, or DAPNet can apply to the Farming Education Fund (FEF). FEF awards are \$100 towards the cost of conference registration, and require a four hour volunteer shift at the conference. Applicants do not have to be commercial farmers.

TWILIGHT MEETING AT DZEN BROS FARM JULY 14

UConn Cooperative Extension's IPM Program and the Connecticut Pomological Society will host a twilight meeting at 5:30 p.m., Thursday, July 14, 2011, at Dzen Brothers Farm, 244 Barber Hill Road, South Windsor. The farm produces Christmas trees, bedding plants, pumpkins, blueberries, and strawberries, and markets through both wholesale and retail channels.

Don and Joe Dzen will talk about production of their crops and ebb and flow benches in their greenhouses, and will show how they prune hundreds of acres of Christmas trees. Lorraine Los and Jude Boucher from UConn will discuss IPM programs for small fruits and pumpkins. Don and Jude will discuss their first year using deep zone tillage on pumpkins.

USDA: REMEMBER TO FILE AGI FORMS WITH IRS

To receive USDA program payments, each payment recipient must have an Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) verification consent form on file with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). This form authorizes IRS to verify that AGI is within the eligibility requirements for USDA programs.

Individuals must submit form CCC-927 and legal entities must submit form CCC-928. Without these forms on file, producers will not receive USDA program payments. This requirement affects both Farm Service Agency (FSA) and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) programs.

Producers have been sent letters indicating forms were not received for 2009, 2010 and/or 2011. Be sure all writing is legible when you submit the form to IRS. Keep copies and note the date mailed. For information on AGI eligibility requirements or the AGI verification process, contact your local FSA office.

FSA FARM LOANS AVAILABLE

FSA may be able to assist your farming operation with a low-interest operating or ownership loan. The rate for operating loans approved in July is 2.3750 percent.

Whether you need loan funds to finance your crop needs for fertilizer and seed, or you need to upgrade your equipment line with a new tractor, planter, baler, FSA may be able to help. FSA's loan programs are designed to help family farmers who are temporarily unable to obtain commercial credit. FSA also provides credit to beginning farmers, farmers who do not have sufficient net worth to qualify for commercial credit, or farmers who have suffered financial setbacks from natural and economic disasters.



USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Marsha B. Jetté reminds farmers and landowners that as part of continued efforts to close the chapter on allegations that discrimination occurred at USDA in past decades, a process has been established to resolve the claims of Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers who assert that they were discriminated against when seeking USDA farm loans.

The process offers a streamlined alternative to litigation and provides at least \$1.33 billion in compensation, plus up to \$160 million in farm debt relief, to eligible Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers. The program provides up to \$50,000 for each Hispanic or woman farmer who can show that USDA denied them a loan or loan servicing for discriminatory reasons for certain time periods between 1981 and 2000. Hispanic or female farmers who provide additional proof and meet other requirements can receive a \$50,000 award. Successful claimants are also eligible for funds to pay the taxes on their awards and for forgiveness of certain existing USDA loans. No filing fees or other costs to claimants are required to participate in the program. Participation is voluntary, and individuals who opt not to participate are not precluded by the program from filing a complaint in court.

USDA is launching a call center for farmers and ranchers, a website, public service announcements, and in-person meetings around the country. Individuals may register to receive a claims package or obtain more information at www.farmerclaims.gov or by calling the 1-888-508-4429. Persons seeking legal advice may contact a lawyer or other legal services provider.
