

APCP RELEASES 2011 FERAL CAT REPORT

Ribaudo, Director, Animal Population Control Program The Department of Agriculture (DoAG)'s Animal Population Control Program (APCP) has released the fiscal year 2011 report for its feral cat sterilization program. This program helps Connecticut non-profit organizations by providing vaccination and sterilization vouchers for Connecticut feral cats. The APCP also provides benefits for pets from municipal impound facilities and dogs and cats owned by Connecticut low-income residents.

The feral cat grant program is a result of the 2007 passage of Public Act No. 07-105; titled *An Act Concerning the Expansion of the Animal Population Control Program*. Chapter 436a/Spaying and Neutering, Sec. 22-380g (b) states in part, "not more than ten percent of the funds deposited in the APCP account shall be used for the sterilization and vaccination of feral cats." The program dedicated \$75,000 for feral cat vouchers.

"At a time when the words 'cuts' and 'reduction' are the norm from state government, our agency is actually giving something back to the public," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve K. Reviczky.

For fiscal year 2011, 925 vouchers were issued to 15 Connecticut organizations. Of that amount, 886 were used (a 96% sterilization compliance rate). All eight counties were represented in the report. New Haven lead the way with 257 cats. Fairfield was second with 209; Hartford, 193; New London, 129; Windham, 55; Litchfield, 36; and Tolland, one feline. In addition, 75 towns/cities were represented in the report, with Bridgeport assisting the most feral cats, 122.

The program provides for the sterilization and two vaccinations for feral cats (defined as wild by nature and not domesticated). Voucher benefits are offered at \$50 for male cats and \$70 for female cats. Two presurgical vaccines coincident with surgery are also included as a \$20 benefit (\$10 per vaccine). Services can be provided by any of the 225 certified participating veterinary practices. Grant benefits are restricted to Connecticut organizations only, and left ear tipping for identification purposes is required. The APCP has provided vaccination/sterilization benefits to more than 75,000 municipal pound pets, feral cats and low-income owner's pets since the program's inception in 1995 helping to reduce the surplus companion pet population in Connecticut by over 50%. 



USDA AWARDS \$2.2 MILLION FOR RESEARCH ON FOOD AND NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

Agriculture Under Secretary Dr. Catherine Woteki has announced new research grants and cooperative agreement awards in eight states—including Connecticut—and the District of Columbia, designed to examine, evaluate, and enhance the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) nutrition assistance programs.

USDA continues to enhance nutrition program integrity and delivery even as demand has increased in response to national economic conditions. This year, USDA is investing in process improvement efforts that examine local office processes and identify and implement efficiencies. The department is also interested in funding projects that use technology to achieve procedural changes, such as document imaging, telephone interviews or Webbased access to case status information.

The grants and cooperative agreements will fund projects in California, Connecticut, the District of Columbia, Massachusetts, Michigan, New York, South Carolina, Texas, and Utah. The projects will examine a number of program-related issues, including:

- the effect of new food packages for the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC), on the prevalence of breastfeeding;
- the effect of switching to electronic benefits transfer (EBT) in WIC on benefit redemptions;
- the effect of the new WIC food packages on participants' food choices;
- beverage choices made by WIC participants;
- the effect of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) on food choices;
- how state program policies and local labor market conditions affect food assistance program participation; and
- the impacts of food assistance programs on alternative methods of assessing poverty.

The 2011 award to Connecticut was for \$129,000 and went to Dr. Tatiana Andreyeva, Yale University in New Haven, to study the economics of beverage choices among WIC and SNAP participants.

USDA's food and nutrition assistance programs—including SNAP, WIC, and the school meals programs—affect the lives of millions of people each day. About one in four Americans participates in at least one food assistance program at some point during the year.

The research projects are competitively awarded by USDA's Economic Research Service (ERS) through a publicly announced and peer-reviewed process. These competitive grants and cooperative agreements fund research on the relationships among food assistance programs, food choices, and the economy; and on using behavioral economics and incentives to promote child nutrition. The latter topic is part of an ongoing collaboration with USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) initiated in FY 2010 to develop a research program in behavioral economics as applied to USDA's child nutrition programs.
