

CT DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE'S CONSUMER-ORIENTED BROCHURES AND LISTINGS

The Connecticut Department of Agriculture has published eight printed brochures and seven additional online listings this season to help consumers find a wide diversity of Connecticut farms and farm products.

These agricultural brochures are distributed to libraries, town halls, and welcome centers throughout the state, and are offered at Connecticut Department of Agriculture displays at various public events.

One of the more popular brochures has been *Connecticut Pick-Your-Own 2013-2014*, a guide to Connecticut's diverse pick-your-own farms. Designed to guide consumers to farms through the entire growing season, from small berries to cut-your-own Christmas trees, it features farms across Connecticut offering an abundance of easy-to-pick fields, trees, and bushes.

Another popular brochure is *2013 Farmers' Markets*. It contains more than 120 farmers markets in 100 municipalities across Connecticut, offering vibrant retail outlets of fresh farm products for consumers. This brochure notes market locations, months, days, hours, and participation in any of the Farmers' Market Nutrition Programs. The Connecticut Department of Agriculture's newest brochure, Experience Connecticut Dairy Products, was produced in June and features 40 dairies including goat, sheep, and cow farms. Connecticut dairy farms producing cheese, yogurt, butter, and ice cream are listed, in addition to those offering a more diversified menu of other farm and agricultural products through a farm stand or store.

Farm Stands and Stores
Across Connecticut lists more than
100 farm stands and farm stores
with their seasons, hours of operation, and overviews of offerings.
The updated brochure is anticipated this summer near the peak of
the 2013 growing season.

Also expected this summer is Connecticut Farm Wineries. This

brochure will be a complementary publication to the already-released *Passport to Connecticut Farm Wineries*, a program run by the Connecticut Farm Wine Development Council. Consumers who participate in the Passport program and receive stamps from 16 of the 32 participating wineries can enter to win one of many prizes.

The Connecticut Farm Map is a popular and useful state road map featuring 204 farms that are open to the public. Symbols on the map designate pick-your-own farms, farm stands, livestock and livestock product farms, Christmas tree growers, maple sugarhouses, greenhouses and nurseries, farmers' markets, honey producers, orchards, agritourism destinations, seafood, ice cream, and wineries.

As with other publications, hours of operation, directions, venue offerings, and contact information are included. This map is often available at state welcome centers, UConn Cooperative Extension Centers, USDA offices, town halls, and libraries.



In conjunction with the Connecticut Apple Marketing Board, the Connecticut Department of Agriculture produces two apple-related publications. *Connecticut Apple Growers* features apple producers throughout the state, while *Apple Varieties and Their Uses* provides popular baking and cooking recipes, information about when traditional Connecticut varieties are available, and which varieties are best suited for pie making, jams and sauces. Both brochures can be expected in early August.

Other publications featuring Connecticut maple producers, Christmas tree growers, noncertified/certified organic farms, and green sector producers are available through state producer associations. The Connecticut Department of Agriculture assists in the distribution of these brochures, while actual publication is organized and produced by each specific association.


