Every fall dairy breeders from around the world flock to Madison, Wisconsin. This city of 240,000 residents has become the center of many dairy cattle to World Dairy Expo, but the few that do make the journey are among the most elite. This year several Connecticut

the dairy universe, and every year it swells with dairy enthusiasts.


Some go to check out the latest dairy innovations or watch the many cattle shows. Others go for the elite cattle sales that are held during the week, while still others go to catch up with old friends and talk cows. <u>World Dairy Expo</u> is a week-long event that unites dairymen from around the world.

For a few Connecticut breeders, the journey to World Dairy Expo's breed shows—Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jr. Holstein, Jersey, Red and White, and Shorthorn means an opportunity to see how well their cattle can compete against the best North America has to offer.

The road to Madison is a yearlong process that begins immediately after the completion of the event each year. Competing at the highest level takes extreme dedication and hard work. Exhibitors work with animals constantly, scrutinize diets, and pay attention to every detail.

This year's shows featured 2,225 head of cattle from 36 states and seven provinces.

One of the nation's smallest states, Connecticut does not send

breeders not only made the trek but did extremely well in the competitions.

In the Jersey show, Arethusa Farm of Litchfield took home the ultimate honor. Page-Crest Excitation Karlie, the first-place finisher in the Senior Three-Year-Old Cow class, was named Grand Champion as well as Intermediate Champion of the show.

Karlie has a successful show season last year as well, with Intermediate Champion and Reserve Grand Champion honors at the 2012 Royal Winter Fair in Toronto. Arethusa Farm purchased Karlie earlier this year at the Franchise Kind Sale II for a world-record price of \$170,000.

Several other Arethusa Farm animals also did well in the Jersey show. Arethusa Exciting Vanguard-ET was second in the Fall Yearling Heifer class, while Arethusa Vida Tequila-ET finished third. The Fall Yearlings also anchored the farm's thirdplace finish in the Junior Best Three Females class.

In the Six Year Old and Older Cow class, Arethusa Veronica's Comet-ET came in fourth, while Milo-Vindication Season-ET finished fifth. *(continued on Page 3)*

OPEN SPACE GRANTS FOR MUNICIPALITIES, LAND CONSERVATION GROUPS

Connecticut's Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) has announced the availability of funds to assist municipalities and land conservation organizations with the purchase and preservation of open space lands through the Open Space and Watershed Land Acquisition program.

Funding for this round will be made available from Community Investment Act funds and may be augmented by state bond funds.

The Community Investment Act (Public Act 05-228) was designed to protect and preserve the beauty and unique character of Connecticut for future generations by providing a new source of funding for open space, protection of farmland, preservation of historic sites, creation of additional affordable housing programs, and important municipal capital improvement projects.

Another Connecticut dairyman did extremely well in the Guernsey show. Dr. P. Morey Miller of Granby exhibited Millborne Hillpoint S Fiesta-ET in partnership with Mike Hellenbrand and Peter Vail. Fiesta won the Senior Two-Year-Old Cow class and walked away with the Fight Bac Guernsey Gold Futurity, then topped off her great day in the ring by being named Intermediate Champion as well as Reserve Grand Champion of the show.

Dr. Miller also exhibited the second-place finisher in the Spring Heifer Calf class, Millborne HP Bentley Holly. Holly is owned by Dr. Miller and Hillpoint Partners.

In the Holstein show, several animals exhibited by Connecticut breeders were among the top ten finishers in their classes.

Quad R Attic Malibu, exhibited by Rick and Shannon Allyn of Canaan in partnership with J & K Cantele, finished first in the Summer Yearling Heifer class, while BVK Atwood Andrea-ET, owned by the Allyns in partnership with Jason Lloyd and Mike Heath and fresh off a grand championship at the Northeast Fall National (The Big E), finished third in a very strong Junior Three-Year-Old Cow class.

Meanwhile, Robrook Goldwyn Cameron, exhibited by Woodmansee Farms of Preston in partnership with Bujon Farms, St Jacobs ABC, and Peter and Lyn Vail, took second in the Four-Year-Old Cow class, while Comestar Larion Goldwyn, owned by JM Valley, the Allyns, Ferme Jendro, D Dubois, F Lemieus, and M.E. Dal Farm, finished third in the Fall Heifer Calf class.

Elsewhere at World Dairy Expo, A First Choice Female, sired by Atwood out of Cameron, sold for \$42,000 at the World Classic sale. The guality of the cattle exhibited this year was truly exceptional.

USDA NRCS BACK IN BUSINESS

USDA's Natural Resources Conversation Service (NRCS) offices in Connecticut are resuming work with farmers and ranchers to implement conservation activities.

The agency is proceeding with implementation of several conservation programs including the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP). However, authority to enroll acres in several other programs, such as the Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP), elapsed on September 30, 2013, due to the expiration of the Farm Bill.

FSMA COMMENTS DUE NOV 15

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) earlier this year extended comment periods until November 15, 2013, on the proposed Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) rules for *Current Good Manufacturing Practice and Hazard Analysis and Risk-Based Preventive Controls for Human Food* and *Standards for the Growing, Harvesting, Packing, and Holding of Produce for Human Consumption*.

FDA took this action to allow interested persons the opportunity to consider the interrelationships between these two proposals, which were published on January 16, 2013, and the two new proposed rules that published on July 29, 2013, *Foreign Supplier Verification Pro*grams for Importers of Food for Humans and Animals and the Accreditation of Third-Party Auditors/Certification Bodies to Conduct Food Safety Audits and to Issue Certifications.

These four proposed rules are part of the foundation of, and central framework for, the modern food safety system envisioned by Congress in the FSMA.

Connecticut farmers will be affected by FSMA implementation. All are encouraged to learn more about the proposed rules and submit any comments they may have by the November 15 deadline.
