

Dairy Farmers Help Local Food Pantries Prepare for Busy Holiday Season

21 Food Pantries Receive Refrigerated Coolers and Funds to Stock with Dairy Products

As food pantries across the state prepare for the increased demand of the holiday season on top of already elevated participation due to the COVID-19 pandemic, 21 Connecticut food pantries now have increased capacity for holding fresh, refrigerated dairy products thanks to the Connecticut Dairy Farmer to Food Pantry Cooler Grant Program.

Through the grant program Connecticut dairy farmers nominated food pantries to receive refrigerated coolers that will keep dairy products cold and safe for distribution to families in need.

The Connecticut Dairy Farmer to Food Pantry Cooler Grant Program was driven by the dairy farm families of Connecticut who recognize and embrace their role in feeding and supporting their communities during both good and challenging times. The program was launched by the Connecticut Milk Promotion Board in coordination with New England Dairy. The grant provided 21 food pantries (full list below) across the state with refrigerated coolers and funds to initially stock the coolers with dairy products for their communities; each cooler can hold 64 gallons of milk.

Despite decline in unemployment numbers across the region, families are still struggling to get back on their feet. A recent <u>survey</u> from Consumer Reports found that one in five American grocery shoppers has used a food pantry since March.

"Having the ability to safely store milk and other fresh dairy items for distribution to our clients will assist us greatly in each pantry's efforts to offer nutritious food to families in need. Our dairy farmers play a vital role in keeping our community healthy and we are grateful to them for this generous donation," shares Louise Riley with Fishes and Loaves in Canaan whose pantry was nominated by dairy

farmer Amanda Freund.

"There's a big need at food pantries across the state and through this program we hope that more families will have access to nutritious dairy products," said Paul Miller, chair of the Connecticut Milk Promotion Board and owner of Fairvue Farms who nominated The Second Star of Jacob pantry in New Haven.

Fran Murphy with the North Branford Food Pantry grew up on a dairy farm in northeastern Connecticut and learned at a young age how hard much hard work and dedication it takes to face the everyday struggles of farming. "Not only are we honored to be receiving the cooler, we are humbled that a farmer whom we have never met would sponsor us. This gesture shows that there is much good left in the world, that as hard as farmers workday in and day out, they still find a way to give to others," shared Murphy. "I have always been amazed at the willingness of farmers to give back to the community consistently." Dairy farmer Ned Ellis nominated the North Branford Food Pantry.

"As more families turn to food pantries for support during the pandemic, refrigeration is the biggest challenge when distributing dairy. We know that dairy is an essential and nutritious part of a balanced diet, and many pantries don't have the refrigeration they need to keep milk cold and safe. This grant program helped farmers address the local need for milk and dairy products," said Heidi Harkopf, registered dietitian with New England Dairy.

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE APPROVES REQUEST FOR DISASTER DESIGNATION DUE TO TROPICAL STORM ISAIAS

Governor Ned Lamont announced December 2 that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has approved his request for an agricultural disaster designation as a result of damage sustained from the impact of Tropical Storm Isaias in Connecticut in early August. The designation means that farmers in the state are eligible to be considered for certain federal disaster assistance, such as emergency loans, to cover production losses they experienced as a result of the storm.

The USDA approved the disaster declaration for five of Connecticut's eight counties, including Hartford, Middlesex, New Haven, New London, and Windham Counties. However, farmers in the remaining three counties – Fairfield, Litchfield, and Tolland Counties – will still be eligible for the emergency assistance since those areas are named as contiguous disaster counties.

To apply, farmers should contact their closest <u>Farm Service Agency (FSA)</u> <u>office</u>. FSA considers each emergency loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of production losses on the farm and the security and repayment ability of the operator. All applications for disaster assistance under this declaration must be submitted within the next eight months.

"Any bit of relief from the damage sustained during this storm will be a benefit to these small business owners," Governor Lamont said. "I appreciate the USDA for approving this designation, and I encourage any farmers who've experienced damage from the tropical storm to contact their nearest FSA office

and apply for assistance."

"Connecticut's agriculture producers have weathered a number of challenges this year, including Tropical Storm Isaias," Connecticut Agriculture Commissioner Bryan P. Hurlburt said. "The USDA disaster declaration will provide much needed assistance to ensure they have the resources available to continue their farming operations."

FARMLAND RESTORATION PROGRAM DEADLINE IMPLEMENTED

The Connecticut Department of Agriculture (DoAg) announces a change to the Farmland Restoration Program (FLRP) application process. Historically, the FLRP has offered a rolling application deadline; however, to streamline the process, an annual deadline has been implemented. Applications should be submitted by January 15, 2021 for projects planned in the upcoming calendar year.

The FLRP is a voluntary program to restore lands into active agricultural production with the main objective of increasing food and fiber production in Connecticut.. The program focuses on restoring and improving land with prime and important farmland soils, in accordance with a Farmland Restoration Program Plan. Each application can qualify for a reimbursement payment of up to \$20,000.

2021 FSMA PRODUCE SAFETY ALLIANCE REMOTE GROWER TRAINING COURSE

Tuesday, January 12, 2021 at 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Wednesday, January 13, 2021 at 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m,

The Produce Safety Alliance (PSA) Grower Training Course has been designed to provide a foundation of Good Agricultural Practices knowledge that includes emphasis on co-management of food safety and environmental management goals, while outlining the requirements of the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Produce Safety Rule. The PSA Grower Training Course is one way to satisfy the FSMA Produce Safety Rule requirement outlined in § 112.22(c) that requires 'At least one supervisor or responsible party for your farm must have successfully completed food safety training at least equivalent to that received under standardized curriculum recognized as adequate by the Food and Drug Administration.' This course will be taught remotely on a Zoom platform as per the remote delivery guidelines established by PSA.

With a grant from Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE), Land For Good will host unique training opportunities for professionals across New England who support farmers in transfer and succession planning. They will hold a training in each New England state in January 2021, which will bring together a diverse group of farm service providers and professionals concerned about farm succession and transfer planning. These trainings will be designed for extension staff, conservation groups, mediators, farm link programs, land trusts, and non-profit agriculture service providers who play succession advising and support roles in their state to learn skills, understand each other's work, and build a referral network in the state.

These one-day, cross-disciplinary trainings will focus on: succession planning basics; networking and team methods; soft issues (family communications, goal-setting, assessment); and case clinic practice, as well as discussions on how to identify client needs, find other providers, communicate disparate content, and problem solve with other providers. They will explore how to effectively support a farm succession planning process using a team approach.

YOUNG FARMER GRANT PROGRAM

The National Young Farmers Coalition (Young Farmers) is partnering with Chipotle to offer \$5,000 grants to help young and beginning farmers and ranchers start up and grow their businesses. VOLUNTARY REGISTRATION FOR HONEY AND MAPLE SYRUP PRODUCERS

<u>Public Act 19-18</u> transferred the regulation of honey and maple syrup from the Department of Consumer Protection to the Department of Agriculture. The public act did not provide for the registration of honey and maple syrup producers, nor did it provide for labeling or sanitary standards for honey and maple syrup producers. The Department of Agriculture has received numerous inquiries related to registration, because honey and maple syrup producers may want to register their operations for market access purposes.

To facilitate market access, the department is accepting voluntary registrations at this time. Please go to our <u>eLicense system</u> to register.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds farmers and ranchers to apply for the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program 2 (CFAP 2) by Dec. 11, 2020. This program provides direct relief to producers facing market disruptions and associated costs because of COVID-19.

Producers have several options for applying for the CFAP 2 program by the Dec. 11 deadline. Producers can find eligible commodities, payment rates, calculations and options to apply on farmers.gov/cfap


