

I don't have to be concerned about putting my own spin on the posts. I also learned to respond to all comments (which I enjoyed!). One thing I found was well received was to ask those reading a post to share the information with someone who might not know. That resulted in that particular post being shared over 50 times. I needed all of this marketing advice & practice. My top goal is to create a PYO daffodil destination, and these marketing tools can only help me do that."



CT FARM WINE DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL TO HOST GROWER EDUCATION MEETING

The CT Farm Wine Development Council, administered by the Connecticut Department of Agriculture, will be hosting a virtual grower meeting on Wednesday, October 27, 2021, from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. The meeting is available at no cost to growers and eligible attendees will earn 2 pesticide recertification

Guest speaker will be Dr. Wayne Wilcox, Professor Emeritus of Cornell University. He led Cornell's grape pathology program for 25 years until his retirement in 2018. His research and extension efforts focused on the applied biology and practical, integrated management of Eastern vineyards' major fungal diseases, utilizing both viticultural and fungicidal tools. Since retiring from the university, he has continued to run fungicide trials and to interact with the industry through programs such as this.

SEAFOOD PROCESSORS PANDEMIC RESPONSE & SAFETY BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM WEBINAR

On September 23, USDA released a Request for Applications for the Seafood Processors Pandemic Response and Safety (SPRS) Block Grant Program. The application period will remain open until 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time on November 22, 2021, through <u>Grants.gov</u>. USDA AMS Grants Division will hold a webinar on Thursday, October 14 at 3:00 p.m for eligible states and territories. The goal of this webinar is to provide an overview of the grant program and application process.

USDA is accepting one SPRS application from each eligible state and territory. Agencies within a state or territory must coordinate and determine which agency is best suited to apply for and manage the grant. CT DAIRY FARMER PROMOTION GRANTS DEADLINE EXTENDED

Connecticut Milk Promotion Board and New England Dairy are offering a competitive dairy promotion grant program to Connecticut dairy farm families and employees. Due to the weather challenges and harvest season, the deadline for the CT Dairy Farmer Promotion grant has been extended until October 15. Funding for this project was paid for by the Connecticut Milk Promotion Board.

Funded projects will be eligible for grant funds of up to \$5,000 annually to improve public perception of dairy farming and/or increase consumption of local dairy products. The total grant funding available is \$20,000. Grants are available for projects that will be completed before May 13, 2022.

APPLICATION PERIOD OPENS FOR PANDEMIC RESPONSE AND SAFETY GRANT PROGRAM TO PROVIDE RELIEF TO SMALL PRODUCERS, PROCESSORS, DISTRIBUTORS, AND FARMERS MARKETS IMPACTED BY COVID-19

The USDA announced Wednesday a Request for Applications (RFA) for the new Pandemic Response and Safety (PRS) Grant program and encourages eligible entities to apply now for funds. Applications must be submitted electronically through the grant portal at https://usda-prs.grantsolutions.gov/usda by 11:59 pm Eastern Time, Monday, November

Appropriations Act of 2021.

The PRS Grant program will assist small businesses in certain commodity areas, including specialty crop producers, shellfish farming, finfish farming, aquaculture, and apiculture; specialty crop, meat, and other processors; distributors; and farmers markets. Small businesses and nonprofits in these industries can apply for a grant to cover COVID-related expenses such as workplace safety measures (e.g., personal protective equipment (PPE), retrofitting facilities for worker and consumer safety, shifting to online sales platforms, transportation, worker housing, and medical costs. The minimum funding request is \$1,500 and the maximum funding request is \$20,000.

The RFA and the PRS Grant Portal provide more details about eligibility for the grant. Eligible entities are required to obtain a free DUNS Number from Dun & Bradstreet (D&B) before applying for this program. USDA has created a custom PRS DUNS number portal at https://support.dnb.com/?CUST=PandemicResponse.

FINAL REMINDER: CFAP DEADLINE 10/12/2021

The final deadline for filing a new or modified application under the <u>Coronavirus Food Assistance Program - Phase 2</u> (CFAP 2) with the USDA-Farm Service Agency (FSA) is <u>October 12, 2021</u>. The purpose of CFAP 2 is to provide financial assistance to producers who faced and continue to face market disruptions and associated costs because of COVID-19. Most crops are covered as well as dairy, livestock, poultry and eggs.

For producers of fruits, vegetables, aquaculture, honey, maple sap, Christmas trees and tobacco (referred to as "sales commodities), CFAP 2 payments were originally based upon 2019 calendar year sales of eligible crops. USDA announced an amendment to the CFAP 2 payment calculation for producers of "sales commodities" to substitute 2018 sales for 2019 sales. Producers who already received a CFAP 2 payment are encouraged to take a look at their 2018 sales and contact their USDA FSA Office to modify their CFAP 2 application if using the 2018 sales would result in a higher payment. If a producer hasn't filed a CFAP 2 application for "sales commodities", those producers now have the option of using either 2018 or 2019 sales. Payments for "sales commodities" producers who began farming in 2020 and had no

dairy, livestock, poultry, eggs and silage and grain corn.

Producers are encouraged to immediately contact the <u>FSA Office</u> that serves their farming operation with questions they may have along with procedures to file a new or modified application and related paperwork. Producers should call their FSA Office before visiting the FSA Office since FSA may have restrictions in place for in-person office visits. Sales records are not required at the time of signup but producers may have to provide evidence of total sales if the application is selected for a later spot-check. As of 10/4/21, 1,589 applicants have received \$31,549,621 in CFAP assistance. Don't miss out on this opportunity! Detailed information also can be found <u>here.</u>

USDA INTRODUCES NEW INSURANCE POLICY FOR FARMERS WHO SELL LOCALLY

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is rolling out a new insurance option specifically for agricultural producers with small farms who sell locally. The new Micro Farm policy simplifies record keeping and covers post-production costs like washing and value-added products.

USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA) created this new policy based on research directed by the 2018 Farm Bill, and it includes feedback from producers who grow for their local communities. The policy will be available beginning with the 2022 crop year.

The Micro Farm policy is available to producers who have a farm operation that earns an average allowable revenue of \$100,000 or less, or for carryover insureds, an average allowable revenue of \$125,000 or less. The policy builds on other RMA efforts to better serve specialty and organic crop growers.

2021 ORGANIC CERTIFICATION COST SHARE GRANT PROGRAM

The Connecticut Department of Agriculture is applying for the National Organic Certification Cost Share Program (NOCCSP) Grant from the USDA Farm Service Agency.

Through this grant, Connecticut certified organic growers and processors can be reimbursed for 50%, up to \$500, for the cost of receiving and maintaining USDA organic certification. A list of certified organic growers and processors is available through USDA's Organic INTEGRITY Database at https://organic.ams.usda.gov/integrity.

The program is administered on a first-come, first-served basis until funds are exhausted. The amount reimbursed will be 50%, up to \$500, of the certification cost paid between October 1, 2020 and September 30, 2021.
