Connecticut Department of Agriculture Releases 2022 Farm Viability Grant Guidance

The Connecticut Department of Agriculture announces the 2022

The 2022 program will again fund projects which directly respond to problems, interests, or needs in the state's agricultural industry, specifically in the following areas:

- Urban agriculture
- Food systems
- Diversity, equity, and inclusion in Connecticut agriculture
- Farmland access

"COVID-19 demonstrated that our food system is fragile and narrow. We will build off the funded projects in 2021, which were a starting point to address the needs of the industry and marketplace, as there is still ample opportunity for growth within these segments," said Agriculture Commissioner Bryan P. Hurlburt. "We are committed to being responsive to the needs of our agriculture community, including urban and underserved farmers, in a comprehensive manner."

Applicants will select from one of the four Question of Focus areas and submit a project proposal that responds to the question, developing a potential solution, or progress towards a solution for the priority area.

The four Questions of Focus are:

- 1. Urban Agriculture: Projects that focus on establishing or expanding support and resources for urban agriculture.
- 2. Food Supply Chain: Projects that would make kitchen space available to process CT Grown farm products or propose plans/development for construction of meat processing facilities/food hubs, co-op operations or increase market opportunities for CT farmers.
- 3. Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) in Agriculture: Projects which directly impact farmers in one or more of the following classifications: limited resource, BIPOC, veterans, members of the LGBTQ+ community, or people with a disability.
- 4. Land Accessibility: Projects that address land accessibility and pilot an effort to improve accessibility for new farmers, current producers looking to expand their operation, or support succession strategies for farmers exiting agriculture.

The FVG is a matching grant program for Connecticut municipalities, groups of municipalities, regional councils of governments and agricultural non-profit organizations for projects that directly impact and/or foster agricultural viability. Funding for the Farm Viability Grant is provided through the State of Connecticut Agricultural Viability Grant Program, established in 2005 through Public Act 05-228, An Act Concerning Farmland Preservation, Land Protection, Affordable Housing, and Historic Preservation.



CT GROWN FOR CT KIDS GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATIONS OPEN

Applications are now being accepted for the newly launched Connecticut Grown for Connecticut Kids Grant Program administered by Connecticut Department of Agriculture (DoAg) in collaboration with the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) and the Connecticut Farm to School Collaborative (FTSC). The pilot program will be funded for two years with a total of \$500,000 through American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

Eligible entities will be able to apply for up to \$24,999 in funding with no match required for projects that fit within the four priority categories: Infrastructure, Experiential Learning Opportunities, Farm to School Planning and Pilot CT Grown Purchasing Programs.

FARM CREDIT EAST IS SEEKING INTERESTED YOUNG LEADERS TO ATTEND GENERATIONNEXT SEMINARS

A successful manager is required to master many aspects of the farm business. To help the next generation develop the necessary business and financial skills, Farm Credit East is once again hosting GenerationNext seminars, and is currently seeking interested young leaders to attend. <u>Inperson sessions are limited</u>, however a virtual option is also available.

GenerationNext is optimal for those producers who will be the next generation operators of a farm business or for entrepreneurs starting their own business (Suggested age 20-35). The sessions will cover a range of topics, including leadership and management, human resource development, financial management, production economics, marketing, risk management, and farm transfer and estate planning.

Whether just entering into a management role or an experienced manager, participants will gain valuable insights from Farm Credit East farm business consultants and from their GenerationNext colleagues.

USDA BUILDS PANDEMIC SUPPORT FOR CERTIFIED ORGANIC AND TRANSITIONING OPERATIONS

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will provide pandemic assistance to cover certification and education expenses to agricultural producers who are certified organic or transitioning to organic. USDA will make \$20 million available through the new <u>Organic and Transitional Education and Certification Program (OTECP)</u> as part of USDA's broader <u>Pandemic Assistance for Producers initiative</u>, which provides new, broader and more equitable opportunities for farmers, ranchers and producers.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, certified organic and transitional operations faced challenges due to loss of markets, and increased costs and labor shortages, in addition to costs related to obtaining or renewing their organic certification, which producers and handlers of conventionally grown commodities do not incur. Transitional operations also faced the financial challenge of implementing practices required to obtain organic certification without being able to obtain the premium prices normally received for certified organic commodities.

Signup for 2020 and 2021 OTECP will be through Jan. 7, 2022. Producers apply through their local Farm Service Agency (FSA) office and can also obtain one-on-one support with applications by calling 877-508-8364. Visit <u>farmers.gov/otecp</u> to learn more.


