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# CT Department of Agriculture Announces CT Grown 4 CT Kids Grant Recipients

\$452,268 Awarded to 32 Public School Districts, Early Childcare Providers, Non-Profits, and Small Businesses to Develop Farm-to-School Programs

Agriculture Commissioner Bryan P. Hurlburt announces that the Connecticut Department of Agriculture has awarded 32 grants from the Connecticut Grown for Connecticut Kids Grant (CTG4CTK Grant), totaling \$452,268 to develop and enhance farm-to-school programs. Established under P.A. 21-0002, S. 364, these awards will increase the availability of local foods in child nutrition programs, allow educators to use hands-on educational techniques to teach students about nutrition and farm-to-school connections, sustain relationships with local farmers and producers, enrich the educational experience of students, improve the health of children in the state and enhance the state's economy.

"Response to the Connecticut Grown for Connecticut Kids Grant program has been tremendous and we are pleased to double the number of awardees this year with increased funding capacity," said Agriculture Commissioner Bryan P. Hurlburt. "We are especially appreciative of the advisory committee members who participated in the review process to ensure these projects will have a meaningful and immediate impact on students access to fresh, nutritious CT Grown foods while providing interactive learning opportunities related to agriculture, nutrition, food and health."

Eligible entities were able to apply for up to \$24,999 in funding with no match required for projects that fit within four tracks:

- Track 1: Connecticut Farm to School (K-12) Local Procurement Grant
- Track 2: Connecticut Farm to School (K-12) Experiential Learning Grant
- Track 3: Connecticut Producer Capacity Building Grant
- Track 4: Connecticut Farm to Early Care and Education (ECE) Grant

The program received 72 applications totaling \$1,022,285 in requested grant funds. Selection was highly competitive, and the review was conducted by a statutorily authorized review panel and Commissioner Hurlburt. This is the

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Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) and the Connecticut Farm to School Collaborative (FTSC).

Are you a producer or agricultural cooperative looking to expand, transition, diversify, or innovate your operation? The 2023 Farm Transition Grant informational guidance and application are available. **Applications will be** 

#### **New Farmer Micro Grant:**

Open to CT Farms with one full year to three years of production history. Maximum award is \$5,000, and the required cash match is 25%.

Examples of eligible expenses: Production or processing equipment directly related to agriculture, small buildings, greenhouses/hoop houses, irrigation, pasture fencing, other equipment purchases related to increasing production.

#### **Infrastructure Investment Grant:**

Open to CT Farms with at least three years of production history with a need for infrastructure to expand the farm's production and operation. Maximum award is \$20,000, and the required cash match is 50%.

Examples of eligible expenses: Livestock/pasture fencing to increase herd size/production type, barn remodeling/expansion, equipment to assist in increased production of farm products, irrigation systems for increased production, tractor attachments specific to agriculture to diversify farm products, etc.

#### **Research & Development Grant:**

Open to CT Farms with at least three years of production history to conduct research, explore or assess the viability and interest in developing a new product line, service, or market. Maximum award is \$25,000, and the required cash match is 40%.

Examples of eligible expenses: Consultant fees, equipment to pilot a product or concept, other expenses related to exploratory product development including fees associated with product, recipe, and market testing.

#### **Innovation & Diversification Grant:**

Open to CT Farms with at least three years of production history looking to implement a new product or service for market or business expansion. Maximum award is \$49,999, and the required cash match is 50%.

Examples of eligible expenses: Expansion of product offerings including value-added processing equipment, equipment that will assist in diversification of farm products, construction of a farm store or processing kitchen, innovative technology or software, or marketing and outreach to promote the new product, service or market.


FACT awards competitive grants of up to \$3,000 to working, independent farmers located in the 50 United States and five major U.S. territories who raise beef cattle, bison, broiler chickens, dairy cows, ducks, geese, goats, laying hens, pigs, sheep and/or turkeys. **This year, FACT will fund the following types of projects:** 

► Farms that wish to improve and expand pasture for animals. These grants for farms to transition to pasture-based systems, expand animals'

▶ Farms seeking one of three animal welfare certifications: Certified Animal Welfare Approved by A Greener World, Certified Humane, or Global Animal Partnership Animal Welfare Certified (steps 4 to 5+). These grants will be made for on-farm projects that help improve animal welfare.

▶ Farms that already hold one of the welfare certifications above to build capacity or maintain certification. These grants can be for on-farm production-related projects, or for other projects related to the marketing, sales, and distribution of welfare-certified products.



### CLIMATE SMART FARMING: AGRICULTURE AND FORESTRY GRANT

The Connecticut Department of Agriculture (CT DoAg) announces the Climate Smart Farming: Agriculture and Forestry Grant Guidance is now available with up to \$7 million available in funding for projects which support climate smart farming practices. Funding is provided through Public Act 22-118 Sec 12(b)(70) which provides \$7 million for fiscal year ending June 30, 2023. **Applications are due no later than 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, January 18, 2023.** 

The Climate Smart Farming: Agriculture and Forestry Grant can fund projects in a variety of areas including, but not limited to:

- 1. Providing technical assistance.
- 2. Distributing a grant to producers.
- 3. Coordinating training programs.

- 5. Creating tools that help reduce barriers to accessing assistance for climate smart farming.
- 6. Establishing equipment-sharing programs.
- 7. Other activities that will increase the number of farmers who are implementing climate-smart agriculture and forestry practices.

Any agribusiness or entity, including nonprofit organization, soil and water conservation district, colleges and universities, municipality or for-profit organization in the State of Connecticut are eligible to apply.

All agricultural commodities can participate including aquaculture, agriculture and forestry. In addition, all production types will be supported including conventional/organic, indoor/outdoor, soil/water, and urban/rural.

CT DoAg plans to issue awards in varying amounts for program implementation from May 1, 2023, through May 1, 2028.

There will be four application funding tiers:

**Tier 1:** \$100,000 to \$249,999

• Project duration: Up to 18 months

**Tier 2:** \$250,000 to \$499,999

Project duration: 18 months up to 2 years

**Tier 3:** \$500,000 to \$999,999

Project duration: 2-3 years

**Tier 4:** \$1,000,000 and up

Project duration: 3-5 years

There is **no match requirement** for this grant.

Farmers do not need to have an identified successor to participate in this course.

## \$5,000 GRANTS TO 75 YOUNG FARMERS AND RANCHERS

For the last three years, the National Young Farmers Coalition (Young Farmers) has partnered with Chipotle to support young and beginning farmers and ranchers start up and grow their businesses with a flexible funding opportunity each spring. The program provided 50 farmers and ranchers with \$5,000 each in the spring of 2020, 2021, and 2022. Grant recipients also received a one-vear membership to the National Young Farmers Coalition.

In the fourth year of the program, the program will offer 75 grants to a new cohort of young farmers and ranchers in 2023.

In addition to growing the number of grants we are offering this spring, we are adding an additional lens to the program of **regenerating soil and community** to celebrate the deep and visionary care for land and community that the next generation of farmers embodies.

What can a Young Farmer Grant do?

for anything that will further your goals as a farmer, even if that means just getting started. The goal of this fund is to provide financial assistance for any cost that currently limits your ability to start, run, or grow your operation in the way you'd like.

Grant funding may support completing a project, purchasing a new piece of equipment, covering operating costs such as seeds and compost, building new infrastructure, attending a farmer training program or conference, hiring additional farm labor, or covering personal finances that stand in the way of farm success, including but not limited to childcare, housing, or student loan payments. Funds, once awarded, may be used to match other grant opportunities.

These grants are available to farmers of all races and gender identities. To ensure that our grants are contributing to ending inequity in access to agricultural careers, we commit to providing a minimum of 50% of our grants to Black, Indigenous, and other people of color, and 50% of grants to female-identifying, non-binary, and trans farmers. These are not mutually exclusive identity categories and should not be understood as adding up to 100% of available grants.

#### NRCS EXTENDS APPLICATION PERIOD FOR FY2023 CSP FUNDING

Thomas L. Morgart, Connecticut State Conservationist for the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has announced that due to the amount of interest and some newly-included climate smart activities for the agency's Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP), he is **extending the application period from December 16, 2022, to February 17, 2023**.

CSP is perfect for agricultural producers who want to continue to farm and forest landowners wanting to manage their forestland but want to use less resources and have less of an effect on the land. Implementing climate smart agriculture and forest activities under CSP will assist producers in their work to address the climate crisis and build more resilient operations through enhancements that may deliver measurable reductions in greenhouse gas emissions and/or increase carbon sequestration. Many CSP activities offer cobenefits and ancillary benefits that help operations build climate change resilience while addressing other natural resource concerns such as soil health, water quality, pollinator and wildlife habitat, and air quality.

entire operation. Agricultural producers and forest landowners earn payments for actively managing, maintaining, and expanding conservation activities such as cover crops, ecologically-based pest management, buffer strips, and pollinator and beneficial insect habitat – all while maintaining active agricultural or forestry production on their land. CSP also encourages the adoption of cutting-edge technologies and new management techniques such as precision agriculture applications, on-site carbon storage and planting for high carbon sequestration rates, and new soil amendments to improve water quality.

The program helps producers better evaluate conservation options and benefits to their operations, as well as to our natural resources. Methods and software for evaluating applications help producers see why they are – or are not – meeting stewardship thresholds and allow them to pick practices that work for their objectives. These tools also enable them to see potential payment scenarios for conservation early in the process.

While applications for CSP are accepted year-round, to be considered for FY2023 funds they must be received by February 17, 2023.

The Women's Business Development Council's Equity Match Grant Program is designed to help Connecticut women-owned businesses grow! Grants between \$2,500 and \$10,000 will be awarded for clearly defined projects that will have a measurable impact on the business, its growth and profitability. The grant funds cannot be used towards operating expenses, payroll, or real estate improvements. Applicants are required to provide a minimum 25% match.

#### Eligibility

#### Businesses must:

- be at least 51% woman-owned
- have been established for at least two years
   have a record of annual sales/revenue in the last twelve months greater than \$25,000 and less
- be headquartered in CT, registered in the state of CT and owned by a CT resident

  • be owned by a woman at least 18 years old
- be in good standing with the CT
- · have an established business checking
- utilize a formal, digital bookkeeping/ financial system (e.g., QuickBooks)
   be a for-profit business

#### The following businesses are not eligible:

On to care businesses (see https://ctwbdc.org/childcare-business/funding for info on funding opportunities for thild care businesses); businesses of individuals that have previously received an EMC or WBDC municipal grant medical marijuand; lead istores and alcohold stributo special transfers as such as strip clubs; vape retailets, to become shops and smoking lounges, businesses having to do with gambling; punistores and ranges, cash advance, check cashing, or pawn shops buil bones, collection agencies or services; and auction or bankruptcy or fire or "feat our lease" or "going out of business" or similar sale; current WBDC vendors or contractors (former vendors are aligned a year after working with WBDC).

#### **Match Requirement**

Applicants are required to provide a minimum 25% match, unless their business is located in an economically distressed community, as defined by CT DECD.

For example, if the business receives a \$10,000 grant, the business must have invested \$2,500 in their business over the past 12 months OR be able to invest an incremental \$2,500 of their own funds in the purchase they are seeking to fund.

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#### 2022 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE UNDERWAY IN NEW ENGLAND

Last week, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) mailed the 2022 Census of Agriculture paper questionnaires to all known agriculture producers across the nation and Puerto Rico. <u>Last month</u>, producers in the states received their survey codes with an invitation to respond online. Any New England producer who did not respond online now has the option to complete the ag census at <u>agcounts.usda.gov</u> or by mail. Producers who have already responded to the 2022 Census of Agriculture online do not need to respond again. **The deadline for response is Feb. 6, 2023.** 


"The census is a critical tool that gives farmers a voice to influence decisions that will shape the future of their community, industry, and operation," said Angie Considine, acting state statistician of USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service, New England Field Office. "Your answers to the census impact farm programs and rural services that support your community. When you receive your form, don't miss the opportunity to be counted. Every operation small and large makes a difference."

The Census of Agriculture remains the nation's only comprehensive and impartial agriculture data for every state, county, and U.S. territory. Farm operations of all sizes, urban and rural, which produced and sold, or normally would have sold, \$1,000 or more of agricultural products in 2022, are included in the ag census. The data inform decisions about policy, programs, rural development, research, and more. The Census of Agriculture is the producer's voice in the future of American agriculture.

Responding to the Census of Agriculture is required by law under Title 7 USC 2204(g) Public Law 105-113. The same law requires NASS to keep all information confidential, to use the data only for statistical purposes, and only publish in aggregate form to prevent disclosing the identity of any individual producer or farm operation. NASS will release the results of the ag census in 2024.
