3. Public Comment

a. Reggy St. Fortcolin: Asked about a more accessible public facing website for the Food Policy Council and asked about the status of \$10 million in food infrastructure funds that were to go to the bonding commission after a legislative workgroup created a final report with guidance.

6. Board Member Updates

- a. Tida Infahsaeng: Released the 2025 Alice Report, 40% of the state is considered ALICE, \$400 increase for families with babies, marketplace plans are going to significantly increase, 211 is anticipating that they will see a huge surge in demand and so are looking for more assistance. 2025 ALICE Report: https://www.ctunitedway.org/wp-content/uploads/2025/08/state-of-alice-report-connecticut-2025.pdf

- b. Patrick Doyle: Seeing increasing challenges of homelessness and its impacting community gardens. Only have one federal grant. Focusing on providing workforce development, spaces for people to grow and have community. Have seen a good response this year to our farmers market- every Monday from 3:30-6:30
- c. Martha Page: City of Hartford has a CDC reach grant and just starting year 3 of this grant and the City is having trouble understanding what the CDC expects of them. Just finished as a reviewer on the USDA LFPP grant and saw a lot of interest in accessing these funds, awards should be made shortly. People are still trying to be optimistic about making progress on this work.
- d. Kafi Rouse: EVI program (Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Program), did some get new guidance to continue on building out EV charging stations. Work on connecting underserved areas and small businesses to apply to do this construction. Rethinking how we're approaching public transportation- getting you through your daily life instead of just from work . 750 new bus stop shelters, 61 battery electric buses, micro transit pilot program have new routes for people to close that first and last mile gap.

SNAP-Ed was not funded for FY2026. DPH/USJ SNAP-Ed programming will end September 30, 2025

- f. Bryan Hurlburt: no significant impacts from HR:1 to DoAg. Had a press conference with DSS and the Governor at Foodshare to discuss food insecurity. They received 3 million this last session to purchase direct food. Farmers market nutrition program on pace to come very close if not exceed last years redemption. At \$517,000 currently and still have Sept-Nov. Did a lot of messaging with DPH to WIC participants.
