2011 CT SPECIALTY FOOD PRODUCT AWARDS

The CT Specialty Food Association (CSFA) held its tenth Product Awards Competition on Thursday, February 17, 2011, at the Agua Turf in Plantsville. Three hundred twenty-nine specialty food items from Connecticut-based manufacturers were entered into 38 categories, with hopes of receiving the prestigious honor of CSFA Product Award Winner 2011. A complete list of Thursday's winners appears below.

A panel of 40 judges consisting of local media personalities, food writers, and chefs from the CT Department of Agriculture's Farm-to-Chef Program scored products on overall taste/flavor, consistency/texture, appeal, and color. Each judge was assigned to specific categories, responsible for evaluating an average of approximately 30 different products.

Categories included breads, cheese, confections, CT Grown, fruits and vegetables, gift packs, gluten-free, organic, pasta sauces, savory condiments, snack foods, and many others. We also proudly included a variety of CT wines along with beers, ales and distilled spirits all produced here in Connecticut. The wide array of products featured fresh breads, ice cream and sauces, jams and jellies, salad greens, pestos, pickles, juices, hot teas and coffees, flavored seeds, oils and vinegars, and much, much more.

"It is always amazing to see the diversity and quality of the foods and beverages made by producers right here in Connecticut," said Tricia Levesque, CSFA Director. "This competition showcases the best of the best in the state. Each year we seem to find additional entrepreneurs looking to showcase the amazing products they produce. Not only are these products perfect for everyday meals and parties, they also make wonderful gifts. There is always something for every member of the family.'

"Purchasing products from Connecticut companies also fuels our local economy and helps create jobs here in our state, which is so important in today's economy," Ms. Levesque continued. "It really is a win-win for everyone - consumers get the best quality foods available and Connecticut companies stay strong."

EFFECTIVENESS OF HOME BREWED DEER REPELLENTS IN CONNECTICUT

The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station is continuing its research into the effectiveness of repellents to prohibit deer browsing on agricultural crops and homeowners' landscape plantings and gardens in Connecticut.

Do you have a home-brewed deer repellent you think works well?

The Experiment Station is soliciting unique, effective "home remedy" deer repellents to evaluate alongside commercially available repellents.
