From the Commissioner



As you are well aware, one of the most persistent challenges we face is the prevention of contraband entering our facilities. This issue not only threatens the safety of our staff and the incarcerated population, but also undermines the integrity of our correctional system.

Contraband items—whether drugs, weapons, or unauthorized electronics—pose serious risks. Stopping these items from getting inside requires vigilance, teamwork, and unwavering

commitment from all of us.

I am pleased to announce that the Agency has recently received funding for four body-scanning chairs. These scanners will provide a noninvasive and effective way to detect hidden objects. Not only will their use increase the level of safety within the prisons, but they will also significantly reduce the number of strip searches required. Within a few months, two scanners will be placed at the Manson Youth Institution, and the other two at the York facility. As part of a pilot program, each facility will have a body scanner in the A/P and visiting room areas – two primary areas of entry into a facility.

Aside from trying to hide contraband on oneself, the mail is the other most frequent way for drugs to enter the facilities. Over the years, the world of illegal drugs has undergone significant transformations. People are no longer sticking to traditional drugs; many are experimenting with a wide variety of substances, often synthetic or designer drugs. Between fentanyl's high potency (100 times more potent than morphine), and bug spray being sprayed on paper – detection is becoming increasingly difficult.

For that reason, the Department is working on procuring mail-scanning machines, which have the ability to detect if a piece of mail was treated with a foreign substance. These mail-scanning machines will be a great asset in helping to reduce the amount of illicit drugs entering the facilities.

It is important to remember that no matter how impressive it is, we cannot rely on technology alone. Your diligence is essential in protecting not only the institution, but also the community at large. As always, I am grateful for your dedication and hard work. Your efforts are not unnoticed, and they are vital to the mission we share.

Torch Bearers

Twenty five members of the Department's Critical Incident Stress Response Team (CISRT) recently attended a week-long training held at the University of New Haven in order to enhance their skills and preparedness. The Critical Incident Stress Management training took place May 5-9. Participants were instructed on the basic principles of suicide prevention; defusing practices; debriefing skills after traumatic events; and support for grieving individuals. Upon completion of the week-long training, participants qualified for nationally recognized certification from the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation.

HITEC Holds Successful Workshop & Welcomes New Members

Various members of the Department of Correction's Health Improvement Through Employee Control (HITEC) gathered at the UCONN Health Center for a daylong facilitator workshop.

HITEC Design Team facilitators from a variety of facilities (including: Carl Robinson, Osborn, Cybulski, York and the Manson Youth Institution), in addition to Unified School District #1, and union representatives met back in March for an opportunity to enhance their skill sets.

HITEC Design Teams consist of small groups of Department of Correction (DoC) staff members who collaborate with UCONN staff members, and other academic partners with the goal of improving the health, safety, and well-being of DoC staff. Staff trained facilitators guide Design Teams throughout the program.

Experienced facilitators received a refresher class in skill building, while the new facilitators in attendance learned valuable knowledge to take back to their design teams. The biannual facilitator workshops are designed to empower and increase the number of front-line correctional professionals who have the necessary tools and techniques to guide and support design teams through the HITEC program. Workshops also provide an opportunity for facilitators to meet and share ideas from various facilities across the state.

Attendees participated in a range of breakout groups, practicing scenarios to enhance their active listening skills and techniques. These skills help them to address opposing points of views, with the goal of finding mutually beneficial solutions.

In a post workshop evaluation, attendees reported being able to use skills learned in many situations, such as facilitating design teams, collaboration with others, and methodically addressing any problem that may require a solution – while at work or off duty.

In addition to their work within their individual teams, all of the design team members are currently also working on developing strategies to support a healthy retirement for all DoC employees.
