Transportation Safety Research Center: Eric gave a presentation on the UConn Crash data repository <a href="www.ctcrash.uconn.edu">www.ctcrash.uconn.edu</a> and noted that a recent enhancement is the availability of "story boards"

This allows a user to see where crashes have occurred, can be varied by time frame, severity of crash, and whether the crash involved a bicyclist or pedestrian (among other categories). Eric explained that the Model Minimal uniform crash criteria (MMUCC) will be upgraded soon and this may enhance the data collected. All data is submitted electronically. There is a time lag in getting information on fatal crashes – towns take 6 to 9 months to complete reports on these crashes, but the Data center does get fatal information from the Office of Chief Medical Examiner. The federal FARS (Fatality Analysis Reporting System) lags by about 1 ½ years.

Anyone can access the data, a login is needed to do more detailed analysis, but this can be obtained online.

The Transportation Institute is also developing a Vulnerable Road User (VRU) Safety Assessment tool. This tool will do the following: Screen road network for trends; Diagnose hot spots; Select countermeasures; Prioritize projects; Cost Benefit Analysis; Evaluate before and After.

A question was asked – what about municipal road high crash locations? Towns can ask DOT to use the CT Roadway Safety Management System (CRSMS) which is similar to the VRU tool being developed but does not focus on bike/ped. Additionally, The LTAP (Local Technical Assistance Program) can provide road safety audits to towns free of charge. Contact Donna Shea or Mary McCarthy for this program.

UConn does not do a lot of analysis of the crash data, they provide information on trends. A weekly graphic of trends goes to DOT Thursday of every week. The data base provides the information to others who can do analysis. The data base does include information on make and model of vehicle. Distinguishing between SUV vs crossover vs passenger car is difficult for reporting police officers. They are looking at ways to capture data on "near misses".

### **DOT Projects. News. Updates:**

Gold Star Bridge report due next month. The pedestrian/bike path is closed because of the recent crash/fire. DOT and SCRCOG are trying to set up improved bus service to help individuals who were dependent upon the path to walk or bike across the river. Current service is hourly. Limiting factor for improving bus service is availability of operators.

Complete streets policy committee working on finalizing the policy, several bureaus are involved.

Highway Design manual update on bike chapter created and being reviewed internally

Pedestrian Safety Through Speed Management: Pilot project pedestrian safety zones identified, one being furthered by DOT. Location not identified.

Pedestrian Safety Zones – how do towns proceed to set these up? On state roads, work with the state. On local roads, municipality can address using state's speed setting document, which was updated in 2021. It notes with respect to Pedestrian safety Zones, that such zones must be complemented by other speed reduction methods, like those included in a speed management plan.

Concern for matching funding from State for Towns for improvements on State roadways such as SS4A – how will DOT view SS4A projects on state roadways? Anna will report back next month.

The Putnam Bridge access project is on track for Spring 2024 completion.
