## **E-BIKE CLASSIFICATIONS:**

<sup>\*</sup>The new law states that e-bikes without pedals and with motors 750 watts and above will be classified as motor-driven cycles and require a driver's license to operate them.\*

## CT'S E-BIKE RULES FOR THE ROAD

- The same operating rules that apply to bicycles generally apply to e-bikes
  - Like bicycles, e-bikes must have and display lights and reflectors at certain times and under certain conditions
  - Unlike bicycles, all e-bike riders are required to wear helmets
- When traveling slower than traffic, e-bike riders
  must ride as far to the right side as is safe, as
  judged by such person, except when: passing a
  vehicle, preparing to turn left, avoiding hazards etc
- When traveling on a sidewalk or crosswalk, e-bike riders, like bicyclists, must yield the right of way to any pedestrian and give an audible signal when passing
- Municipalities are allowed to regulate e-bikes use within their jurisdiction
  - There are local ordinances prohibiting riding on sidewalks, certain trails, etc
  - Check with your town or city for local rules and regulations

E-Bikes allow riders to ride more often, farther, and for more trips. However, the faster you are going, the more serious any crash will be. Always wear a helmet and ride responsibly.
