Annual Re-Enrollment Coming Soon!



The annual Connecticut Vaccine Program (CVP) and Connecticut Vaccines for Adults Program (CVFA) re-enrollment period is coming up! Please keep an eye out for a communication in the next couple weeks with more details. As a reminder, re-enrollments are done electronically in CT WiZ and will be due in December.

Data Quality Corner

CT WiZ "News" on Home Page

Every time you login to CT WiZ, please make it a habit to review the "News" section on the CT WiZ home page.

This is updated often with important and timely news for all users regarding changes in CT WiZ such as system down time, enhancements, vaccine ordering updates and much more.

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CVP Updates

Vaccine Ordering in CT WiZ:

- Orders are by pack size (not by doses). As you add vaccines to your order, the total amount will update. Carefully review the total order for accuracy to ensure all amounts are correct before submitting to DPH.
- If you notice any issues with an order, contact DPH immediately at 860-509-7929.
- Clinics should only be ordering for a one-month supply to avoid over stock. Orders can be placed multiple times a month, if needed.
- If you will not be able to use doses prior to their expiration date, submit a help desk ticket (select Immunizations (CT WiZ) - CT WiZ Training and Inventory Support-CT WiZ Inventory Management) and DPH will provide a transfer list.



2024-2025 Connecticut School Immunization Data Now Available



The Connecticut Department of Public Health has released the 2024–25 School Immunization Survey results. Connecticut reported the highest kindergarten MMR coverage in the nation at 98.2%, a 0.5% increase from last year and well above the national average of 92.5%. Connecticut is one of only 10 states to exceed the 95% herd immunity threshold for measles. Public school kindergartens reported higher coverage (98.4%) compared to private schools (95.1%).

Medical exemptions among kindergarteners remained steady at 0.4%, while religious exemptions continued to decline, dropping from 0.1% to 0.02%. These trends reflect both changes in state law and the ongoing efforts of providers and schools to keep children on schedule with recommended vaccines.

It is important to note that kindergarten enrollment significantly declined this year, and the overall survey response rate decreased as well. This is likely due in part to recent changes in the state's minimum age requirement for kindergarten entry, which impacted enrollment data.

Despite these shifts, Connecticut continues to maintain strong vaccination coverage, protecting children and communities across the state.

Educational Resources from Vaccinate Your Family

Vaccinate Your Family has shared a new free, interactive, self-paced educational program called the <u>Vaccination Community Learning Program (VCLP)</u>. The VCLP is the newly updated and expanded version of the Vaccination Community Navigator curriculum.

These courses help ANYONE build vaccine knowledge, communication skills, and confidence to promote vaccination in their communities. All courses are free, mobile-friendly, and accessible from anywhere. Right now, the VCLP is only available in English. Spanish translations are in development.

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Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) Updates

ACIP September 2025 Meeting

The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) met on September 18-19, 2025, to review and vote on recommendations related to MMRV (measles, mumps, rubella, varicella), Hepatitis B, and COVID-19 vaccination. Overall, discussion and votes reflected the recent emphasis on shared decision making but maintained most access to vaccines.



ACIP recommendations have not yet been signed by CDC leadership, which currently limits our ability to place orders.

CT DPH will send out a communication with more information as it becomes available.



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Provider Spotlight

Dr. Claire Free - 2025 Connecticut Immunization Champion

Not all heroes wear capes. Some wear white coats and vaccinate a generation. One such hero is Dr. Claire Free, who was named the Association of Immunization Managers' (AIM) 2025 Immunization Champion for Connecticut, a well-earned honor for a provider whose name is synonymous with dedication, compassion, and vaccine advocacy in her Brookfield, Connecticut community.

Whether it's a routine childhood immunization or a deeper conversation addressing vaccine hesitancy, Dr. Free approaches every conversation with empathy and science. And her dedication does not stop at the exam room. As a member of the Danbury-area Immunization Action Plan (IAP) advisory group, she has been a collaborative voice in community efforts to expand access and equity in vaccination, ensuring all children, regardless of background, can be protected from preventable diseases.



During the COVID-19 pandemic, when new requirements called for real-time electronic reporting of vaccines to CT WiZ, Dr. Free continued to demonstrate her commitment to her patients. Like many providers who had practiced for many years, Dr. Free initially kept paper medical records and had not yet embraced utilizing CT WiZ on a regular basis. Instead of resisting change, she led it. Together with her dedicated nurse, Liz, and their small team, Dr. Free learned to navigate CT WiZ, mastering data entry, vaccine ordering, and inventory management. Additionally, the team undertook the task of entering all 1,200 of their patients' historical immunization records, ensuring those families would have accurate, accessible immunization records long after Dr. Free retires.

Dr. Free's innovation did not stop there. Partnering with IAP staff through the CDC's Immunization Quality Improvement for Providers (IQIP) program, she made a major push to increase HPV vaccination rates in her adolescent patients. She started recommending the vaccine at age 9, trained her staff to deliver a unified message to families, and added HPV educational materials to her waiting room. In just two years, the rate of adolescents receiving one dose of the HPV vaccine by age 13 rose by over 60 percentage points and up-to-date by age 13 rates climbed over 20 percentage points at her practice, an extraordinary achievement.

When asked what made her an advocate for immunization, Dr. Free shared a powerful memory. As a young resident, she treated a child suffering from a severe form of varicella (chickenpox) pneumonia. Despite every effort, the child passed away, an outcome Dr. Free expressed could have been prevented with a routine vaccine. That moment never left her and drove her continued vaccine advocacy.

That dedication and advocacy is clear in her interactions with families. Parents describe her as thoughtful, intuitive, and grounded. As one mother wrote, "She really knows your child and she is the old school kind of doctor that I wish we found more often."

Dr. Free is the provider who goes the extra mile, learns the new system, has hard conversations, and always puts her patients first. She is a difference-maker and true champion for immunizations.
